LAND, STOCK AND CROP. —July wheat is quoted at 86 1/2 in Chicago and August at 88 1/2.

—Eighteen first class two-year-old steers for sale H. M. Ballou.

—Sam H. Baughman bought of Mr. Yaden 255 sheep at \$2 per head.

—Georgetown is to have a creamery with a capacity of 1,500 pounds per day.

—Since March 1 Chicago packers have slaughtered and sold 868,000 hogs.

—Ninety-three head of short-horns were sold in Louisville Wednesday, at an average of \$180.

—In Bourbon county Charles Adair sold 30 lambs to Jas. Bagge, that averaged 90 pounds, at \$5.25 per cwt.

—Bond & Lillard, of Anderson county, delivered to Mr. Brown, of Cincinnati, 100 head of fat cattle, averaging 1,360 pounds, at \$5.75 per cwt.

—I have a thoroughbred Short-horn bull which I will stand at my place near the Danville toll-gate at \$2 the season. J. M. McRoberts, Jr.

—A year ago hogs were selling at Chicago for \$6.00@7.35 for light and \$6.85@7.45 for heavy. Yesterday the sales were \$4.60@5.20 for light and \$5.10@5.35 for heavy.

—Winchester stock day was a failure so far as sales of stock were concerned. The Democrat has heard of one large sale of wheat at 78c. J. A. Nash sold to W. M. Gay, of Bourbon, 32 head of 1,500 pound cattle at 65¢ per pound, to be delivered next week.

—Joe Mercer sold his present crop of wheat, about 400 bushels, at 75 cents per bushel. This is the first sale of the season. 24 head of 4 to 7 year-old mules sold at \$125, a car load of 1,100 lb cattle at \$5.10 per hundred and 16 head 1,400 lb cattle at \$4. —[Bowling Green Gazette.
