The judge takes the further grounds that the general local option law passed by the present Legislature is constitutional and valid, which was denied in the petition.

—Wm. Morgan, a brakeman, was killed by the cars at Bardstown Junction.

—John Shelby bought in Fayette, three standard bred brood mares at \$130 to \$210.

—W. D. Snow bought in Casey a lot of butcher stuff at 2 1/2c and a bunch of extra good heifers at 3 1/2c.
