CHILDREN'S HOME.

The Kentucky Children's Home Society, Rev. Wm. Shoemith, State superintendent, office, 930 6th street, Louisville, Ky., while perhaps the youngest of organized benevolences in the State, is certainly not the least in effort and result. Its mission is to seek out homeless and destitute children and to find homes for them with the least possible delay. The work is un-denominational. It stands in relation to the children. If a child is homeless and is found in body and mind and of good disposition it is entitled to and will receive the care of the society. In organization, the society is National, State and local. In 1884 it was organized in Chicago. It now has auxiliaries in 23 States and Territories. December 20, 1895, the Kentucky society was organized, since which time it has effected local organization in about 90 counties in the State, has found homes for and placed 115. It is becoming thoroughly well-known and wherever its principles are understood it gains heartiest support. By means of a local advisory board in each county seat, and an associate member in each magisterial district in the county, the society is kept apprised of the whereabouts of homeless children and of childless homes. When a child is placed in a home in the jurisdiction of an advisory board, a quiet oversight is kept, and neglect or abuse of the child is absolutely impossible.

In face of the orphanages, denominational and fraternal, there are thousands of destitute children, who if not cared for, homed and trained, will grow up in pauperism and crime, and the State through its criminal courts must reckon with them. These children cared for, will become reputable citizens in the great majority of cases. The State in its treatment of its unfortunate classes has attempted the cure rather than the prevention of crime. It has failed most disastrously. The Ky. C. H. S. proposes its prevention and is contributing its limit of ability to the prevention. Contrasts between former and present condition of its wards are in testimony to its success.

A few days since a homeless child was taken and placed in a home of wealth and refinement, another was almost starved, in need of everything, is now in an excellent home, with every want supplied, still two others taken by a humane society from worthless parents, are homed in midst of comfort and purity; another from a county poor-house, to a good home, in which an opportunity in life is largely supplied. Others have been and are being lifted from abjectness to everything that is desirable. This quietly, unobtrusively, economically. The method is Biblical, humane, statesmanlike, and considering the effectiveness of the work, is a marvel of economy. Experience has demonstrated that the average annual cost for caring for a child is \$100, whether in orphanage or a poor-house, or approximately \$100 per child.

The method of this society involves an entire average cost of \$50 for placing a child in a home and all subsequent supervision until it is of age. The work is supported by benevolence. A system of memberships constitute its source of revenue. In no other direction will money accomplish so much good. By paying a benefactor's membership fee of \$100 in a single payment, or \$20 annually for five years, any one may have two children received in his name. The name and address of the children will be given such donor if he desire it.

By paying a patron membership fee of \$50 in a single payment, or \$10 annually for five years, you are credited as above with saving one child. By paying a life membership fee of \$25 in a single payment, or by paying \$5 annually for five years, you become one of two who save a child. These three memberships are accompanied by a beautifully engraved certificate.

By paying an annual membership fee of \$1 you become one of 50 who save a child. The society is but 14 years old, yet has placed upward of 10,000 children. Last year 2,300 were homed and an average daily placement of more than six children is the testimony to the need for, and effectiveness of the Children's Home Society. Funds are needed and we bespeak an investigation of our methods by those who have means to aid in benevolent work. The officers of the State Board are: President, Judge R. H. Thompson; vice president, Gov. W. O. Bradley; secretary, Mrs. F. C. Duncan; treasurer, Dr. S. P. Walker; State Supt., Rev. Wm. Shoemith. VICINITY NEWS.

W. D. Cozatt has been appointed postmaster at Rollings, Casey county. Gov. Bradley refused to pardon Tilford Mize, of Rockcastle, for detaining a woman.

In Knox county John Snow was shot and killed by Fred Handman while they were quarreling.

John Smith and Fred Harkler shot each other to death near Barbourville in a quarrel over an account.

Toll-gate raiders destroyed eight gates in Jessamine county and warned the keepers to collect no more toll.

The case of small pox at Middleboro has made Pineville, Barbourville and other towns adopt a shot gun quarantine against her.

The Montgomery county fiscal court has purchased four of the turnpikes leading into Mt. Sterling, an aggregate of 25 miles, for \$14,093.

At Pineville, \$3,000 worth of lumber belonging to the Thompson Lumber Co. and \$1,000 worth of staves owned by Clark & Co., went up in flames.

The partially decomposed body of Lincoln Wilson was found under a pile of underbrush in Whitley county. John Lovitt, is charged with the murder.

J. Frank Walton, who used to be assistant principal of the preparatory department of Centre College, recently passed the civil service examination for a position in the Cincinnati post-office. He stood second in a class of about 40 and has been given a place.—Advocate.

A strange fatality seems to have followed John Kirby, Sr., and John Kirby, Jr., uncle and nephew. At Berea, John Kirby, Jr., who was lately married, was stabbed, it is charged, four or five times by Paul Keglar. John Kirby, Sr., aged 65, while working on a scaffold, became dizzy and fell, breaking several ribs and injuring himself internally and fatally.
