BRO. KLINGMAN MAKES CORRECTION.

STANFORD, JUNE 16.—Permit me to make a correction in the religious column of your paper. In the issue of June 16 you said: "Mr. Klingman is a member of the Christian church" but differs with the doctrine of that church in that he believes neither in Sunday schools, missionaries nor the use of an organ in church." I take it for granted that you use the phrase "Christian church" in the popular denominational sense. I am not a member of that denomination or any other—simply a member of the body of Christ—the church revealed to us in the New Testament. If you mean by Sunday schools, organizations of men, you are right in saying I do not believe in them. If you mean the great and good work of the church in teaching the young and old the word of God I prefer to show you my works and not my faith only. Each Lord's day morning at 10 o'clock it is my privilege, when at home, to teach a Bible class of from 25 to 30 persons in a room that swarms with children who are taught by competent instructors "the way of the Lord."

If you mean by "missionaries" the work of missions, 11 years' experience as a missionary ought to prove a man's faith. Part of this time was spent in the mountains of Kentucky, in the city of Louisville, in New York and other places. Besides this, hundreds of dollars have passed through my hands for foreign missions and the letters from missionaries in other lands written to me personally are treasured. The congregation in Louisville, with whom I worship and labor, gave last year about \$150 to missions, home and foreign, besides caring for the widows and orphans and supporting the work at home.

In regard to the organ in church and my not believing in it, makes but little difference what I believe—that is not the question. I am against everything that God has not put in the church of Jesus Christ. Come and hear for yourself.
