Sixteen splendid horses were exhibited and each looked as if his groom had spent many weary hours rubbing and otherwise preparing him for the Annual Horse Show. A large crowd was present and the day was a splendid one to advertise the many stallions in this and adjoining counties. Following is a list of those shown:

Dorsey Goldust, the well-known sire belonging to F. Reid; a substantial horse with a long, rich pedigree.

King Eagle, the fine saddle stallion of S. T. Harris and R. B. Woods; a good individual and a recognized breeder. They also showed a three-year-old mare by King Eagle.

Naboth, Jr., was shown to the halter. He is a grand looking horse and his pedigree is all right. J. R. Beazley has a great horse in him.

Dignity Dare, D. S. Carpenter's sire of saddle and harness horses, was as pretty as a picture and one of the popular animals of the day.

Antecarlo, owned by William Fields, but driven by Bledsoe Bailey, showed wonderful speed and good action. He is an exceedingly handy horse and is a proven breeder.

Red Bond, A. E. Hundley's magnificent bay, showed speed, action and style. He is richly bred, a fine individual and a gentleman's horse all over.

Red Leaf, the blue string wearer, was shown by R. E. Goddard, who had him in ship shape. He makes a favorable impression wherever he is seen.

Kentucky Squirrel, Col. W. Huff Dudder's good saddle stallion, was creditably exhibited by that gentleman's little grandson, Carroll Dudder. He was greatly admired. See pedigree and description next issue.

Prospect, son of Dignity Dare, and like his sire a model of equine beauty, was shown by C. T. Sandidge, who is making the season with him.

Preston, the elegant saddle stallion belonging to J. Carroll Bailey, was admirably shown by that gentleman. Not only a good looker, but a "good doer" as well, is Preston.

The Warfield, a beautiful brown and a horse of fine style, was driven by R. C. Engleman, Jr., who owns him. He showed good speed and an abundance of action.

Dixie, the pretty Shetland pony of Charlie Nunnelley, was greatly admired by lovers of the small horse.

Dock Gray was the smallest horse shown and attracted fully as much attention as any of them. He is owned by Master Hugh Reid Foster, but E. H. Beazley is making the season with him.

Clay King, owned by W. B. Burton, of Lancaster, was splendidly shown by Malcolm Tillet, who made the black fellow fairly fly up and down the street.

George Hur, a fine draft stallion, the property of William Sprinkles, attracted a full share of attention. He stands 16 hands high and weighs about 1,600 pounds.

Wood Wilkes was shown in harness with Felix White, who made him step lively. He is a large, well built horse and his pedigree, which appears in this paper, shows that his breeding is all right.

FARMER'S DEPARTMENT.
