**NEWS NOTES.**  
Chaplain George W. Collier, U. S. A., retired, is dead at Delaware, O.  
Dr. James Wallace, president of McAllister College, at St. Paul, Minn., has resigned.

At Watash, Minn., six persons were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the depot hotel.

A petition for a divorce has been filed by Prince Phillip, of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, against Princess Louise.

An engineer was killed and two other persons badly hurt in the New York Central railroads at East Rochester, N. Y.

Mrs. Caroline Elizabeth Monell, aged 90 years, a granddaughter of John Adams, died at Fishkill Landing, N. Y.

Forty-seven deaths from the heat were reported Tuesday in the cities of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburgh and Buffalo.

The brother of the widow of Herr Krupp was found dead at Buenos Ayres under circumstances indicating that he was murdered.

Ten persons died from the heat in New York and as many more in Chicago. To make matters worse in New York, 600 ice men have gone on a strike.

It is announced that all of the 502 shares of stock acquired by Thomas F. Ryan, and carrying with them control of the Equitable, has been made over to three trustees.

Paul de Roulede, the French political refugee, will, it is stated, visit the United States for the purpose of studying our Constitution with a view to advocating a revision of that of France.

Waller Rodes, of the Central Kentucky Traction Company, and Detroit capitalists are in Frankfort seeking to purchase the local street railways as well as the interurban lines.

Senator William A. Clark, of Montana, is reported to be steadily improving, the wound made in trephining the patient's skull in the operation for abscess of the brain healing nicely.

Robert E. Duncan, who had successively held office as County Clerk, County Judge and Prosecuting Attorney of Hancock county, besides serving a term in the Legislature, committed suicide at the Confederate Home by opening arteries in both wrists and cutting his throat.
