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IN NEIGHBORING COUNTIES.

Barbourville needs more dwellings. There is not a vacant small house in the town.

The Controller of the Currency has approved the conversion of the Citizens' Bank, of London Ky., into the Second National Bank, of London, with \$25,000 capital.

G. T. Gooch and Fred Hunt have purchased the machine shops of L. E. Hunt and the business will hereafter be conducted under the firm name of G. T. Gooch & Co.—Mountaineer.

J. Warren Cunningham, former editor of the Middlesboro Record, has accepted a position with the comic opera company, "The Mayor of Tokio," now playing at the Garrack Theater, Chicago.

A. Longo, Thomas Longo, C. P. Cecil, Jr., and Frank West, of Danville, have filed articles of incorporation with the State department at Frankfort incorporating the Lon-Kola Co. at \$25,000. Lon-Kola is a light drink after the order of Coca Cola.

Claiming that James Smith, of Middlesboro, attacked him with a beer bottle because he sought to protect a small boy who was being roughly handled by Smith, John Golden emptied the contents of a shotgun into the heart of his assailant, death resulting instantly. Golden has surrendered to the authorities.

O. H. Waddle, owner of the street railway franchise at Somerset, has been granted by the City Council an extension of 60 days, from July 17, in which to begin work. The council was induced to take this course on the assurance that arrangements had been made for financing the enterprise, and that actual work would begin on or before the time named.

NEWS NOTES.

The boycott of American goods is now on in full force at Shanghai.

Damage aggregating \$800,000 was done by a landslide at Naples, Italy. At Coalburg, Ala., a man shot and fatally injured his wife, thinking her a burglar.

Mary Staggs, 16 years old, was burned to death at her home, Olive Hill, Ky.

Several bombs were thrown into a crowd at Byelostok, Russia, and several were killed.

E. G. Martin, Jr., a young physician of Rocky Hill, Ky., died from an overdose of morphine.

Peter Hansen, aged 80 years, well known as a Danish poet, died suddenly at Cedar Falls, Iowa.

Mobile has quarantined against New Orleans because of the alleged existence of yellow fever in the latter city.

In a wreck on the Southern Pacific at Dryden, Texas, an engineer was killed and a fireman injured, probably fatally.

More desperate fighting on the island of Sakhalin resulted in the surrender of a large force of Russians, including 14 officers.

Two Munich scientists have, by means of the Roentgen ray, succeeded in photographing the human heart between beats.

More mutiny has been discovered in the Russian Black sea fleet, and as a result the summer maneuvers have been called off.

M. T. Hancock, a millionaire piano manufacturer and inventor of Los Angeles, Cal., was killed in an automobile accident there.

William J. McDonald, a flagman of the Long Island railroad, saved the lives of an unknown woman and her baby, but died a martyr at his post of duty.

As a result of the Chicago teamster strike being officially declared off, the men are seeking back their old places, the rush amounting almost to a stampede.

One man was killed and two were injured, one of the latter fatally, in a head-on collision between freight trains on the Louisville & Nashville near Pulaski, Tenn.

A mysterious robbery of the Main street millinery house of David Baird & Co., Louisville, resulted in a loss of about \$3,000 to the firm. The booty consisted of silks and laces.

Twenty-four men were killed, 17 were injured and 55 horses were hurt by the explosion of the bomb aimed at the Sultan of Turkey. It is believed to have been the work of Hungarians.

By a vote of 6 to 2, Road Supervisor George R. Ashurt was convicted by the Bourbon Fiscal Court of the charges recently preferred against him of neglect of duty etc., and formally notified of his removal.

Gov. Hoch, of Kansas, announced that he would declare the office of State Treasurer, now held by J. J. Kelly, vacant because of Kelly's refusal to give a new bond, his old bond having been involved in the recent failure of C. J. Devlin.

As the result of the plunging of an automobile into a ditch, followed immediately by the explosion of the gasoline tank, 14 year old Olive Johnson, of Lima, O., was burned to death and five other persons were more or less seriously injured. The scene of the accident was near Indianapolis.

Louis Garret, aged 28, of Newport, and his 17 year old wife, former a suicide compact, agreeing to jump from the bridge into the river. Arriving at the scene of their contemplated crime they began arguing as to which should jump first. The bridge patrolman overheard the remarks of the excited couple and reached the wife just as she was about to make the fatal plunge. Garret and his wife were placed under arrest.

The evidence introduced at the preliminary trial of Scott McQuinn and John Lane, charged with the killing of Frank Smith and his two sons on July 15, tends to show the crime to have been one of the most cold-blooded in the criminal annals of Wolfe county. Concealing themselves in a barn, they awaited the coming of the Smith boys, firing and killing them instantly. The father of the murdered men hearing the shots ran to the scene from his home, 300 yards away, and was in turn shot down. The accused men were held without bail.

A frightful boiler explosion occurred on the United States gunboat Bennington, in the bay at San Diego, California. As a result 75 of the crew are known to be dead, and 16 others reported missing, have almost certainly perished. In addition scores of men were injured, more or less severely. The explosion came without warning, and a terrible scene was presented by the decks of the vessel and the surrounding water after the occurrence. The cause of the explosion is unknown, though the boiler is said to have been thought unsafe for some time. Commander Lucien Young, a Kentuckian, was on shore at the time of the explosion. The Bennington was launched in 1890. While the vessel did not sink, it is believed it will have to be dismantled before repairs can be made.
