James E. Kera, one of the best-known horsemen in Central Kentucky, has made a general assignment at Paris.

G. G. & J. C. Hamilton's barn near Mt. Sterling, containing 15,000 pounds of tobacco, a lot of feed and machinery, burned.

George C. Bennett, Fred Cook's crack two-year-old for which he refused \$30,000, died at Churchill Downs, Louisville, of pneumonia.

In Arizona, ranchmen fed their hogs this year on peaches. The fruit was so abundant it could not be marketed at a profit and it was converted into hog meat.

The Columbus Bishop sale was well attended. Wheat sold at 85c, cows at \$20, clover hay at 35c per bale, timothy \$2c, hogs \$4.31, sheep \$5.63 per head, chickens 8c per pound, turkeys 12c.

Household and kitchen furniture and farming implements brought good prices.

G. Murrell Middleton, of Shelbyville, sold his prize winning yearling Berkshire boar, Premier Baron No. 77887, to William Green, of San Marcos, Tex., for \$500, which is probably the highest price ever received for a Berkshire boar in the State.

DANVILLE COURT.—A big crowd attended court at Danville yesterday, and a good lot of cattle were on the market but the demand for them was not great and many went home unsold. A bunch of good 700-pound heifers sold 2c. Good horses and mules were in active demand.

J. W. Newman has bought to date over 300,000 barrels of corn in Woodford, Jessamine and Fayette, paying \$2 for most of it. It is all being delivered at Versailles and is being shelled at the Southern depot and shipped South at the rate of 1,000 to 1,200 barrels per day.—Versailles Sun.

G. A. Parsons, of Obion, Tenn., believes he has the largest turkey in the United States. It is of the Mammoth Bronze family and weighs 53 pounds. It was exhibited at the fairs last year when it weighed 46 pounds. The owner says the largest turkey ever raised in the United States weighed 55 pounds and was presented to Andrew Jackson. Parsons says that by Christmas his bird will weigh 58 or 60 pounds, making it the largest ever raised.

Harry Weissing & Son and W. R. and W. B. Middleton, of Shelby county, bought 13 registered Aberdeen-Angus cattle at M. A. Judy's sale, recently held in Chicago, for about \$6,500. The stock has arrived and is now on the above named gentlemen's farms. In the lot are two cows Messrs. Weissing & Son paid \$1,000 each for. Among the cattle is an exceptionally fine young bull that the Middleton Bros. bought to replace the one they lost by death some time ago.—Shelbyville Record.
