NEWS NOTES.

Fifteen men were badly burned in an explosion at Chicago. Three probably will die.

Fire swept the business section of Manassas, Va., destroying property worth \$100,000.

Four new cases of yellow fever are reported in Havana. There are now 22 under treatment.

Gov. LaFollette, of Wisconsin, announces that he would accept the United States Senatorship.

Senator Chauncey M. Depew has resigned as a director of the Equitable Life Assurance Society.

The safe in the postoffice at Salt Lick was blown open and robbed of \$100 in cash and stamps worth \$200.

H. Clay Stewart, a farmer living at Connersville, dropped dead while making a fire in his kitchen stove.

It is said that Charles A. Peabody has been selected as the next president of the Mutual Life Insurance Co.

The State Board of Valuation and Assessment at Frankfort increased the tax on whisky from \$8 to \$10 per barrel.

Patterns valued at \$1,000,000 were destroyed by a fire in a building belonging to the Illinois Steel Company, in Chicago.

The National Committee for the relief of the Jews in Russia has decided to raise for them at least a million dollars more.

Jo A. Smith was shot and instantly killed on the street at Campbellsville, by James A. Shipp, who used a shotgun. The Coroner's jury pronounced the killing without provocation.

Many shops and factories at Evansville have been forced to suspend operations through inability to get water, owing to damage at the water works plant caused by the flood.

The State Federation of Labor in session at Covington decided to send a telegram to Gov. Beckham requesting that only union labor be employed in the construction of the new Capitol at Frankfort.
