


Special Term Lincoln County Fiscal Court held Dec. 18, 1905, Hon. James P. Bailey, Judge Presiding, with the following Justices: W. D. Wallin, Esq., seconded by C. L. Hensley. It is ordered and adjudged by the court that a franchise for the purposes heretofore stated be granted and sold on the Lancaster & Stanford turnpike road, from the Garrard and Lincoln line to the corporate limits of the city of Stanford; also on the Stanford & Crab Orchard turnpike road on that portion of the road between the towns of Rowland and Stanford; also on the Stanford & Hustonville turnpike road from the corporate limits of the city of Stanford to the corporate limits of the town of Hustonville; also on the Hustonville & Bradfordsville turnpike road from the corporate limits of the town of Hustonville to the Casey county line; also on the Hustonville & Carpenter's Creek turnpike road from the corporate limits of the town of Hustonville to the Casey county line; also over the Turnersville, McKinney & Mt. Salem turnpike road, and the Hustonville & Coffey's Mill turnpike road from Mt. Salem to the Casey county line; also over the Stanford & Hall's Gap turnpike road from the corporate limits of the city of Stanford to the terminus of said road, thence over the Highland & Waynesburg turnpike road, to the right-of-way of the Cincinnati, New Orleans & Texas Pacific Railroad at Waynesburg; also over the county road at or near Reuben Curtis' to the Painski county line, at or near Eubanks. The franchise hereby granted shall be sold as an entirety or whole, at public outcry, at the court-house door in the city of Stanford, Ky., for cash, to the highest and best bidder, after having advertised the same by the clerk of this court, by publication in the INTERIOR JOURNAL, (the only newspaper at this date published in Lincoln county) four consecutive times preceding the date of sale of said franchise; and by printed notice posted at the court-house door, signed by the clerk of the Lincoln county court. Said sale to be made at the regular January term, 1906, of the Lincoln county court, being the 8th day of January, 1906, at 2 o'clock p. m., standard time.
