A campaign for \$40,000 for a Young Men's Christian Association building in Bowling Green has been inaugurated.

The divorce secured by Anna Gould is now absolute, the time limit for an appeal by Count Boni de Castellane having expired.

St. James' Episcopal church, of South Bend, Ind., has secured a small piece of marble as a relic from the tomb of St. James in Jerusalem.

Noury Karagozian will lecture at the Hubble Christian church Wednesday night at 7:30. Subject: "Marriage Customs of Armenians and Turks."

Three American Mormons have been expelled from Germany as the result of persisting in spreading their propaganda in spite of official warnings to desist.

Rev. James M. King, L.L. D., executive head of the Board of Home Mission and Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, is dead in Philadelphia.

Bishop J. J. Hartley, of the Columbus, O., diocese has written a letter to the Catholic pastors, putting the ban on all night hay rides. Catholic young people who take part in them hereafter will be required to do public penance on information furnished him by the local pastors.

The protracted meeting which has been conducted by the Rev. Sanford L. Logan, of Wilmore, at the Southern Presbyterian church, came to an end last night, after two weeks of most successful work. Many conversions were recorded during the fortnight and a general awakening was felt among the members of the congregation. Mr. Logan made many warm friends while here. He is a minister of power and an attractive personality, and will always be received in Frankfort with a warm welcome.—Frankfort Journal.

In reversing the decision of the Boyle Circuit Court, fining the Q. & C. for transporting liquor into a local option territory, the Court of Appeals held that it was not within the province of the State to regulate or control interstate commerce, the liquor in question, having been shipped from Cincinnati. The court adds that the fact that the liquor in question was brought from Kentucky to Cincinnati by the consignee, the Covington Brewing Company, and there shipped to the consignee in Kentucky, did not in anywise change the legal complexion of the transaction from one of legitimate interstate commerce. It was immaterial whether the common carrier knew or did not know, that the commodity was liquor or that Boyle county was local option territory.

NEWS NOTES.

The stove plant of the Barden Stave Co. at Greensburg, burned.

The Detroit base ball team won the pennant in the American League.

Fifty-one cases of bubonic plague have developed in San Francisco to date.

Mayor Behrman, of New Orleans, has failed to effect a compromise of the levee strike.

Near Hopkinsville, Jack Allen, a Negro, shot his wife 15 times. He loaded his pistol twice while murdering her.

H. J. McCracken & Co., the oldest wholesale produce commission firm in Pittsburg, has gone into bankruptcy.

The lodging of a watermelon seed in the windpipe of five-year-old John Hollahan, of Newport, was the cause of his death.

D. D. Edwards, on trial for murder in St. Louis, admitted on the witness stand that he had killed 14 men in Kentucky and Chicago.

McLean county voted for local option, the majority being 1,055. There was only one "wet" precinct in the county, and it was carried by the prohibitionists.

In a row over a card game at Bull Creek, on the Perry-Letcher border, Frank Napier, a farmer, was killed and Clinton Jones was perhaps fatally wounded.

There are 1,500,000,000 people in the world. They could all be set down in the State of Texas, and each person could be given one-ninth of an acre of ground on which to live.

"The Crittenden Peace Tree," which for 40 years has stood in the Botanical Gardens at Washington, is threatened with destruction to make way for the statue of President Grant.

John R. King, a soldier confined in the guardhouse at Fort Thomas, drank a mixture of wood alcohol and other chemicals and set fire to his cell. He died soon after being rescued.

A. S. Lloyd was appointed receiver of the Hamilton Farm Company, of Montgomery county. The company owns 1,800 acres of land and does an extensive stock raising business.

Two new instructors were added to the faculty of the Western Kentucky State Normal School at a meeting of the Board of Regents. Since January 1 over 1,000 students have been enrolled.

The court of appeals overruled a petition for rehearing in the case of Cal Newton, a prominent Franklin county farmer, sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of George and James D. Smith.

At Danville, Wash., a mob drove a small party of Hindus across the line into Canada, sending a shower of missiles after them. A few shots were discharged at the trespassers, but none were injured.

Beech Hargis, son of Judge James Hargis, of feud fame, of Jackson, was arrested in Cincinnati with Pearl Craft and Lillie Voight and locked up on a charge of disorderly conduct. They were fined \$50 each.

Former State Treasurer Walter Day, charged with forging the name of Floyd Day to a note for \$1,000, was acquitted at Covington, the jury holding there was no proof to show that the note was executed in Wolfe county.

Miss Jennie Gentry was arrested in Lexington on a bench warrant from the Franklin circuit court, charged with subornation of witnesses in the Caleb Powers case. Bond was fixed at \$1,000, which she gave, and was released.


The Doek and Cotton Council of New Orleans, whose membership is made up of all classes of laborers employed in connection with the shipping of the port, numbering about 12,000 men, voted for a general strike. They demand an increase in wages.

A novel effect of the rise in price of foodstuffs is reported from Augusta, Me. Nearly 1,200 of the people of Kennebec county are in open revolt against the prices demanded for meat, and have pledged themselves to abstain from all meat for ten days.

A Maysville dispatch says: The committee on City Missions from the Pastors' Union of this city issued a statement warning citizens against helping beggars on the streets or those coming to the doors, as the town is over-run with beggars of every description.

Here and There.

While trying to act as peacemaker James T. Curtsinger was shot through the heart and instantly killed by John Ryan, a bartender in Louisville.

Sheriff Charles Oglesby, of Pulaski county, Ind., was shot and killed at the Pennsylvania railroad depot at Winamac by three tramps whom he was endeavoring to arrest.

Louisiana cannot legally pay the fare of immigrants to this country, according to a ruling received from the Immigration Bureau at Washington by the Louisiana Immigration Bureau.

Charles W. Goddard, who recently killed his brother, James Goddard, was dismissed on his examining trial at Lexington. It was shown by the evidence that the shooting was accidental.

Alvah H. Martin, first vice president and governor of the transportation of the Jamestown Exposition Company, has been elected director general to succeed Mr. Barr and has accepted the office.

The United Mine Workers have called a strike at the mines of the Proctor Coal Company, the largest in Whitley County. Only a part of the miners entered the organization and many refused to strike.

The committee of the Jefferson Davis Home Association was in Fairview Saturday and decided that the Davis birthplace shall be bought from a popular fund on June 3, 1908, the day of the Davis Centennial, which will be elaborately celebrated.

The governing bodies of two great religious denominations will meet during the week. The general conference of the Episcopal Church convenes at Richmond, Va., and the Council of the Congregational Church of the United States in Cleveland, O.
