Two Burley Societies

TO HOLD ANOTHER MEETING IN LEXINGTON FEB. 6th.

Representatives of 32 counties and nearly 500 tobacco growers from all parts of the Burley belt attended the meeting of the District Board of the Burley Tobacco Union at Lexington last week, and it was announced that about 15,000 acres had been pledged to the cut-out plan for 1911, although by no means all of the pledges secured had been yet turned in.

A conference was held between the committee of the meeting and one from the Burley Tobacco Society, the result of which was that the Burley Society persisted in its position that when the tobacco union secured enough signed pledges to show that it could control the element in the Burley belt which has heretofore refused to pool, the society will join with the union in making a combined effort to cut out the crop of 1911 or otherwise control the production of Burley tobacco this year.

In view of this attitude of the Burley Society, requiring the production of signed pledges, an adjournment of the meeting of the district board of the Burley Tobacco Union was taken to Monday, February 6, when the leaders of the new organization declared they will have enough signed pledges to comply with the Burley Society's demand and convince the most skeptical of their ability to control the independent Tobacco Growers of the Burley district. On that date the executive committees of the Burley Union and the Burley society will hold another conference and another effort will be made to secure the co-operation of the Burley Society with movements on foot by the younger organization.

Crab Orchard is situated in the East End of Lincoln county, one of the counties that comprise the Blue Grass belt of Kentucky. It is one of the oldest towns in the state.
