The body can be 20 to 24 inches wide and 56 inches long. Sheldon's case hardened spindle with brass lined box and Sheldon's oval springs are used on the 1911 model. As is well known the Sheldon spring is unquestionably the best one on the market. The gear is built without splicing, reaches being mortised through the headlock. The beds are made of slat bottoms, running lengthwise. The slats are made of white ash, the edges neatly rounded and fastened with four cross irons to keep the slats from spreading, all nicely varnished in natural wood. The finest Stengal and Rothchild long grain hand buffed leather is used in the trimmings.

Pardon Refused

IN LAUREL COUNTY CASE FOR UNUSUAL REASON.

A special dispatch from Frankfort says: An unusual state of facts was developed in an application for the pardon of Robert Barnes, charged in Laurel county of aiding and abetting murder, and sentenced to the penitentiary for five years. The record shows according to Gov. Wilson, absolutely no reason why the jury found Barnes guilty, and the friends of the man killed, who was an uncle of Barnes, of the same name joined in the application for the pardon. Gov. Wilson refused to grant the pardon because he could not understand how a jury convicted a man under such circumstances. He says in his reasons for refusing the pardon now, that he must understand more about the case and find out why there was a conviction. He says that according to the papers presented to him there was nothing to show that Barnes was guilty in the killing of Barnes, his uncle. The applicants for the pardon are given leave to open the case again after they have granted more evidence of the kind wanted by the Governor. It is probably the first time on record that a pardon was refused because the applicants made too good a showing. It was this very thing that made the Governor cautious about the pardon.
