TO PATRONS OF STANFORD CREAMERY COMPANY

In order that the creamery be enabled to turn out a first class product, the patrons bear in mind that it is necessary to deliver only clear sweet milk and cream to the creamery. Do not mix cold and warm milk or cream together, always cool it by setting cans or buckets in cold water and stir occasionally. Do not put can on tight. It is better cover with screen or cheese cloth. Do not take warm milk or cream and set it in the cellar or anywhere where there is an objectionable odor as milk is very easily contaminated and when so is unfit to make good butter.

Be sure to keep your cans clean and free from rust on the inside use some good wash powder to wash the cans with. If the foregoing rules are strictly adhered to we can always make a first class butter and get top prices for it. Our loss is your loss if get out on your butter prices we can't pay you as much for your butter, being your cream to the creamery at least twice a week.
