### THE PRIMARY MUST COME.

(Danville Messenger.)

The editorial in the Louisville Times of Sept. 28, strongly commending the direct election law, which the next legislature will enact in accordance with the plank, on that subject, in the platform of each party, is one of several articles that show how strong a fight that always influential Democratic paper is prepared to make for that righteous legislation. It makes it clear that it is the will of the Democratic party and the party's mandate to the party authorities, as well as to the legislature, that all democratic nominations shall hereafter be by primary election, in which every democratic voter shall have a vote and have that vote counted.

There is a strong current, as evidenced by the increasing popularity of the initiative and referendum, the election of Senators by popular vote and the universal demand for nominations by direct primaries to get the control of legislation back into the hands of the people.

The Times, in dealing with the subject now, has doubtless heard of the rumored grave error being made by some aspirants for next year's nominations and by their friends, in trying to arrange this far in advance for an evasion of defiance of the party's will.

We refuse to believe that any of the talked of candidates for office would this early, be so bold or so suicidally unwise as to attempt by a combination or conspiracy of any kind to "frame up" a nominating convention instead of the primary method, to which the party is pledged and by which the party authorities are bound. When the time for the next nominations rolls round, each and every democrat will want and demand the opportunity to vote for the man of his choice and every democrat who wants to run for office will have the opportunity of doing so without paying the expense of the primary, but he should seek the nomination in the way the party says it must be made.

Would any democrat seeking office dare, were he a member of the next legislature, to vote against the direct primary election law, for which the present party platform declares? If not, how can he now, or later, ask his county committeemen, who is bound by the same platform, to vote for a convention? The honest, disinterested county committeemen with which the party is blessed, will never vote to deprive their democratic neighbors of a voice in these or other nominations, and should not be asked to do so.

We endorse nearly all that Bro. Landrum says, in the foregoing editorial. If he is right, and we be-

lieve he is, in that democrats will no longer stand for nominations made except by primary, then the direct primary law, which will eliminate from the situation the only excuse ever given for conventions, is all the more imperatively needed, and its enactment by the coming legislature should be a foregone conclusion.

The Elizabethtown News predicts that the Democratic majorities in the First, Second, Third and Fourth Congressional Districts will be McCreary's majority for Governor. This will be in the neighborhood of 18,000 or 20,000 and we believe Editor Sommers has the dope down pretty fine on it, too.

## O'REAR APPROVED RAISE IN TAXES.

One of the most flagrant violations of campaign pledges was the raid upon the tax payers organized by Gov. Willson to cover up his extravagance, and carried into effect under his orders, by his Board of Equalization. Having wasted more than one quarter of a million dollars of the people's money in foolishly exploiting the state militia, he paid the piper by increasing the taxable value of farm lands in two years, \$92,029,431.00. The burden, as usual, fell upon the farmers, the very people to whom Judge O'Rear is now appealing for help, although Governor Willson's administration which was responsible for this increase, meets with Judge O'Rear's hearty commendation.

Governor McCreary asked Judge O'Rear the distinct question if he approved this raise of nearly one hundred million dollars on the farm lands of the state, and it must be said to Judge O'Rear's credit, that he was frank enough to admit that he did approve of it. He said that his political advisers had told him that it would be a dangerous thing to endorse, but that he thought it was lawful and that he believed the republican officials acted honestly under their oath of office.

It logically follows that if Judge O'Rear is elected Governor, and runs the state in debt, as all his republican predecessors have done, he will follow Governor Willson's method of emptying the pockets of the farmers, because his Board of Equalization has the authority under the new law to put any burden on them that is necessary to support the extravagance of the administration.

All honor to Judge Robert L. Stout who sent the chairman of the democratic county committee of Scott county to jail for 24 hours in contempt because he could not produce the ballot boxes used in certain precincts where there was evidence of gross fraud. All of the boxes which the grand jury desired to examine were strangely missing. Testimony before the grand jury indicated that the machine had robbed McDermott in the recent primary.
