## STOCK LAW ELECTION.

Special term Lincoln County Court, held September 5th, 1911. Hon. James P. Bailey, Judge, presiding. In the matter of the petition of the citizens of Crab Orchard Magisterial District asking for an election to be held on the question of stock running at large—

A petition signed by W. Landgraf, John Juffer, August Abt, Edwin W. White, Simon Petrey, G. D. Boone, W. T. Manuel, F. L. Chandler, J. G. Livingston, J. H. Livingston, Wm. Chandler, J. M. Petrey, D. Severs, Julius Bergner, A. Kielbasa, Nic Glutz, David Broughton, Charley Plummer, Joseph Montag, Henry Ridder, constituting 20 votes of the Crab Orchard district, was this day filed in open court, asking a submission of the question whether cattle or any species thereof shall be permitted to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands in the Crab Orchard Magisterial District, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that the persons' names who are signed to said petition are legal voters in said district, and that same is signed by 20 voters thereof, and that the law relative to the calling of said election has been complied with by said petitioners, it is therefore ordered that an election be held in said district at each voting place therein, namely, Crab Orchard Precinct No. 1 and Crab Orchard Precinct No. 2, at the regular November election, 1911 (to be held on the 7th day of November, 1911) upon the following question to-wit: "Are you in favor of making it unlawful for cattle, including asses, mules, sheep, goats and swine to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of the Crab Orchard Magisterial district?"

The officers of election, in each precinct of said district are directed to open a poll at the next November election for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the voters of said district upon said question, and the clerk of this court is directed to have printed on the ballots for each voting place in which the vote is to be taken the question above set out, and there shall also be published 20 days before the election in at least four issues of the Stanford Interior Journal, a notice of said election, which shall give the date of said election, the question to be submitted to the voters of said district and such facts as may be necessary to give validity to said act. ## BIG BURLEY POOL

Will Have Backing at Lexington, of Millionaire Haggin.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 9.—James B. Haggin, by personally affixing his signature to a contract, assured

the success of the ten-year burley tobacco pool by giving it his sanction, pledging the acreage of his Elmemdorf farm the largest burley tobacco crop in Kentucky, and agreeing to become one of the principal stockholders in a mammoth co-operative tobacco factory to be established in this city for the manufacture of pooled tobacco.

Mr. Haggin will become one of the controlling directors of the Burley tobacco society, which is to control the manufacturing operations, and which will be capitalized at approximately \$5,000,000.

For the last two weeks Haggin and his attorneys have been studying the terms and conditions of the pooling and manufacturing plan, submitted to him by the Burley Society officials, with the result that he has decided to back the enterprise, and at his country estate, Elmemdorf, concluded the negotiations by signing the contract with

his own hand.

The Burley Society officials and tobacco growers generally are greatly elated over Mr. Haggin's action in joining the pool and embarking in the proposed manufacturing enterprise, and they feel assured now that the pool and factory are a go.

Lexington citizens are especially gratified for they say this means that this city will become the greatest Burley market in the world, and one of the most important tobacco manufacturing centers in the United States. The factory planned will give employment to more than a thousand men when in operation. Printed contracts for the ten year burley pool are now being sent to tobacco growers throughout the burley belt, and it is expected that the most of the large growers will follow the example of Mr. Haggin and join the pool and take stock in the manufacturing operation proposed as a part of the pooling plan.
