**STOCK LAW ELECTION.**

Special term Lincoln County Court, held September 7th, 1911, Hon. James P. Bailey, Judge, presiding. The petition of W. H. Traylor and others was this day filed in open court, and is now noted of record, praying for a submission of the question whether cattle generally shall be permitted to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of Stanford Magisterial District No. 1 of Lincoln county, Kentucky; it appearing from a consideration of said petition that it has been signed by more than twenty legal voters who reside in and are electors in said Stanford Magisterial District No. 1; that at the time the petition was filed the petitioners deposited with the county court a sum of money sufficient in the judgment of the court to defray the expenses of said election; that by an order of the Fiscal Court of Lincoln county now in force, the magisterial district is fixed as the unit in such elections in Lincoln county; that it is more than 60 days until the next regular election to be held in said district, the court is of the opinion and orders and adjudge that the petitioners are entitled to have the prayer of the petition granted, which is done, and an election is hereby ordered to be held on the 7th day of November, 1911, the regular election day, in the four voting precincts of Stanford Magisterial District No. 1, of Lincoln county, Kentucky, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the voters of said district upon the question whether or not they wish cattle generally to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of Stanford magisterial district No. 1, of Lincoln county, Kentucky, and for the purpose of holding this election the officers of election for said magisterial district are directed to open a poll on the date above named in each of the four voting precincts embraced in said magisterial district, namely Stanford voting precincts Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4. The clerk of the Lincoln county court is directed to cause to be printed on the ballots to be used in this election the question "Are you in favor of making it unlawful for cattle generally to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of Stanford Magisterial district No. 1 of Lincoln county, Kentucky?"

Notice of this election must be published twenty days before hand in the Stanford Interior Journal, the only newspaper published in Lincoln county, which notice must appear in at least four issues of said newspaper. This election shall be held by, and the polls thereof compared and the result announced in the manner, at the time, and by the persons authorized to hold elections and compare the polls and declare the results in elections held for county officers, and the result thereof shall be spread upon the records of this court at its next regular term after the result is declared.

The clerk of the Lincoln county court, the sheriff of Lincoln county, and the officers of election in the several voting precincts embraced in Stanford Magisterial District No. 1 of Lincoln county, Kentucky, are directed to do and perform all of the respective duties required of them by the laws of this commonwealth in advertising and conducting said election, in the preparation and preservation of the ballots and in canvassing and certifying the result of the vote, and it is directed that said election to be held in all respects as required by law governing such elections and the general election law in so far as it applies to this character of elections. In the matter of the petition of the citizens of the Waynesburg Magisterial district, asking for an election to be held on the question of stock running at large:

A petition signed by C. M. Thompson, Morris Wall, S. B. Cheviatt, G. A. Walter, Maurice Singleton, W. G. Haggard, W. Waters, W. D. Johnson, J. A. Singleton, J. A. Hart, J. B. McKee, G. H. Cannon, J. W. Thompson, George Williams, E. W. May, Wm. Morgan, Richard Maynard, Wash Spaw, H. W. Waddles, B. R. Denton, J. R. Blevens, R. Y. Ballard, Seth Reynolds, Bill Spradlin and A. B. Morzan, and constituting more than 20 voters of the Waynesburg magisterial district, was this

day filed in open court, asking a submission of the question whether cattle, or any species thereof shall be permitted to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of the Waynesburg Magisterial district, and it appearing to the satisfaction of the court that the persons whose names are signed to said petition are legal voters in said district, and that same is signed by more than 20 voters thereof, and that the law relative to the calling of said election has been complied with by said petitioners it is therefore ordered that an election be held in said district at each voting place therein, namely, Waynesburg Precinct No. 1, Waynesburg Precinct No. 2, Waynesburg Precinct No. 3, at the regular November election, 1911 (to be held on the 7th day of November, 1911) upon the following question, to-wit: "Are you in favor of making it unlawful for cattle, including horses, asses, mules, sheep, goats and swine to run at large on the public highways and unenclosed lands of the Waynesburg Magisterial district?"

The officers of election in each precinct of said district are directed to open a poll at the next November election for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the voters of said district upon said question, and the clerk of this court is directed to have printed on the ballots for each precinct in which the vote is to be taken the question above set out, and there shall also be published 20 days before the election in at least four issues of the Stanford Interior Journal, a notice of the said election, which shall give the date of said election, the question to be submitted to the voters of said district, and such facts as may be necessary to give validity to said act.
