The fatal disease prevalent among stock, continues taking its toll in Garard, especially in east and north-east Garrard.

Thomas Broaddus, Charles Dean, Mr. Bolton, Mrs. Mary Sanders, William Kay, Miley Walker, Henry Ray. James Simpson and a number of others have lost valuable horses from the malady and mules and cattle have also been stricken.

Dr. R. L. Pointers, the competent veterinary surgeon, finds the disease curable when treated in its first stage, and reports its symptoms similar to meningitis as indicated in human beings. He claims that it is not due to eating mouldy corn, as stock that have never been fed maize have died of the disease. Dr. Pointers believes the epidemic is traceable to a germ made prevalent by the unusual elimatic conditions of the last few months.
