Cholera has been and continues to kill the hogs in the Parksville section. James Tarkington and Joe Tarkington, Jr., have recently lost ten or twelve. The loss is very heavy now on account of the high price of corn. Dr. H. L. Casey, of Danville, vaccinated forty-two for the Tarkington brothers and about a dozen for Joe M. Tarkington, Sr.

Lillard, Fox and McDowell sold, at the Danville pens, the following stock: To Granville Cecil, Sr., 10 800-pound cattle at 6 1-4 cents; 13 calves at \$23, 34 700-pound cattle at 6 1-4 cents, 29 500-pound cattle at 6 cents, to Dr. Pitman, 6 calves at \$20 each, to Joe Irvine 10 500-pound cattle at \$6.12 1-2 per hundred, to D. and T. Rankin, 12 900-pound cattle at 6 1-2 cents, to Thos. Durham 17 calves at \$19, to Jeff Robards 12 680-pound cattle at 6 1-4 cents, 1 bull at \$36, to Price 10 525-pound cattle at \$32 each.

John M. Helm, of the Parksville section, lost a fine steer Sunday. In walking too near a small stream the embankment gave way. It fell in such a position it could not get out. When found it was so chilled from lying in the cold water it could not be revived.

Mr. Phelps Cobb has let Mr. R. S. Scudder, of McKinney, take his nice Preston mare "Etta Bell" to breed this year. She will be stunted to "Rex Peavine." Mr. Scudder pays Mr. Cobb \$300, but "Etta Bell" is one of the finest mares in Kentucky.—Danville Messenger.

Monte Fox, of Danville, sold last week 450 head of cattle to New York parties at \$7.25 per hundred. The cattle had been slop-fed at the distilleries in Marion county. This is one of the biggest cattle deals that has been made in Kentucky in many months.

Fox O'Daniel & Co. have sold to New York parties 540 head of cattle now being fed at the Mueller, Wathen & Robert Distillery at \$7.25 per hundred. This firm also sold to the same parties one car of hogs at 5 3-4 and one car at 5 1-2 cents Gardner & Co. at Loretto, has sold 150 head of slop cattle to parties in Indianapolis, at \$6.90 per hundred, also two cars of hogs at \$5.55. This year bids fair to be a prosperous one for all who fed cattle at the various distilleries during the past winter and cattle feeders are rejoicing over the nice profit they expect to realize.—Lebanon Enterprise.
