ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE A FRAUD

A. W. Carpenter Again Expresses Himself Strongly on Subject

I do not believe there is a man living that is farther from putting the weight of a feather in the way of any organization that is truly fighting the liquor traffic than I am. I firmly believe the majority of Anti-Saloon League supporters are good, honest people, who give their money with hopes and prayers that good may come of it. From the best information I can secure, the churches of Lincoln county donate yearly about \$300 to its support. There are forty counties in Kentucky not canvassed by the A.-S. L. because they are too poor to contribute. I am told that one church in Henderson, Ky., donates \$600 yearly. A lady relative tells me a Baptist church in Owensboro (of which she is a member) donates one hundred dollars yearly. Now, if Lincoln county is an average at \$300 per year, the 80 counties contribute \$24,000 yearly to the Anti-Saloon League.

Now, where does that money go and who gets it? In our recent local option election, they did not contribute as much as thirty cents for the campaign. They proposed to send speakers, provided their expenses were paid. Their proposition was not accepted. But the opportunity was too tempting to let slip entirely, and while our people were worked up to fever heat and willing to give to any one who claimed to be fighting the saloon, one blood-sucker did slip into Hustonville and Moreland, made his little speech, took up a hat collection and card pledges, and skipped out without telling you how much he got, and it was more than you think. While at the same time, the good ministers of our county were going at the risk of their lives through cold and storm without any thought of compensation.

I am reliably informed that for the campaign in Metcalfe county, which closed soon after ours, they rendered no more assistance than they did in Lincoln. Now when field day comes, there will be no speakers sent to Waynesburg, Highland, McKinney or Moreland, where the people are just as loyal and deserving, but are not able to contribute as liberally as the people of Hustonville, Stanford and Crab Orchard. But the last three mentioned towns will have upon services, so the speaker can hit all the temperance people at one shot. He will tell a few blood-curdling stories of drunken tragedies of which we all know too much, get the waters to crying and the hearts of the brethren softened to such an extent, they will go down deep into their pockets and shell out liberally, and he will pocket the most coveted goods and not let you know how much it is; and "hike" out, not to be seen or heard of again until next field day. (That is the way they have been coming.) For this work he gets \$300 per month or \$3,600 per year.

To my certain knowledge, the Prohibition party in Kentucky has not received as much as \$300 in the last two years. From the best estimates obtainable, since the organization of the Anti-Saloon League of the United States, there has been paid into its treasury over \$7,000,000. And what is the result? More liquor made and drunk last year than ever before. Don't you think a more proper name would be "Aunt Saloon Leak?" From what I know of the Anti-Saloon League, I

pronounce it one of the most consummate swindles of the age. And some of its high officials, who claim to be preachers, are boldly accused of most villainous conduct and they do not deny it.

Now, I have given a few gentle hints about the "Aunt Saloon Leak" and while I am not able to paint in living flames on the tablets of the skies, or call on Jupiter to rise and snuff the moon, yet I throw down the glove to any man who wants to defend the "Aunt Saloon Leak" feeling that I am prepared to "shell the woods" and throw a few bombs that will cause some people to sit up and take notice.
