SQUIRE K. D. NOAKES DIES AT CRAB ORCHARD

Prominent Citizen of East End of County Passes Away After Lingerling Illness.

After a lingering illness, Squire K. D. Noakes passed away at his home a few miles from Crab Orchard, where he had lived most of his life. He was surrounded by his friends and loved ones when the end came, and all that tender hands could do, ministered unto him in the last hours.

Squire Noaks was one of the best known citizens of the eastern end of the county, and had frequently been honored with distinctions and office by his fellow citizens. He was elected a member of the County Fiscal Court at the last county election being a leading republican of his section. He had served faithfully and well as a federal soldier during the war, and at its close took up the warfare in a greater cause, and for over forty years had labored as a minister of the Baptist denomination as well as devoting attention to his farm. He was a prominent member of the Masonic and Odd Fellow lodges and was buried with full services by these orders Friday after services at the Ephesus church, which were attended by a large concourse of friends and loved ones.

Squire Noaks had the confidence, esteem and love of all who knew him, and it will be generally felt that a good man has gone to his reward. He is survived by his wife and a large family, who have the sympathy of a host of friends in this, their hour of grief.
