CAUGHT A HAWK.

Dan Traylor Slips Up on "Sky Pirate" While Killing a Crow.

A man who has an eye "like a hawk" is generally supposed to be mighty keen sighted. That's what his friends are saying about Dan

Traylor, one of the proprietors of Traylor's distillery and one of the best known young farmers of Lincoln county. Mr. Traylor performed an unusual feat at his farm on Dix river last week, which is causing such comment. He slipped on a large chicken hawk while it was trying to kill a crow which it had caught, and took the hawk captive without so much as ruffling a feather.

Mr. Traylor was starting across a field rather early in the day, where a number of crows had been feeding. Suddenly he saw a very large chicken hawk swoop from the skies among the crows and seize one and grapple with it on the ground with its talons. The crow seemed to be putting up a fight, and kept the hawk's attention pretty well to the business it had cut out, so that Mr. Traylor was enabled to come up and catch the hawk before it was aware that he was near. The crow, which the hawk had not had time to kill, made its escape. Mr. Traylor says that he could have as easily caught it, too, if he had thought of it, and he is sorry that he did not.

The hawk was almost as large in body as a hen, with a spread of wings from tip to tip over two feet. Mr. Traylor had it killed and presented it to Col. Cal Faekler, the revenue man, who carried it to Danville to have it stuffed and mounted.

\$35,000,000 In More Pensions

President Taft has signed the new pension law which carries an increase of \$35,000,000 for pensions during the first year of its operation. During the first three years the increased payments to veterans will average \$22,000,000. As finally agreed to the bill provides increased pensions for 420,965 veterans. Every veteran serving ninety days or more in the naval or military service during the Civil War, who has been honorably discharged and who is over 62 years old, is cared for by the new law. For veterans 62 years and over the rate provided in the law, for ninety days' service is \$13 a month, and it ranges to \$16 a month up to three years of service; for 66 years old and over the rate is \$15 a month for ninety days and ranges up to \$19 for three years; for 70 years old and over, the rate for ninety days is \$18 a month for three years; at 75 years old and over, the rate for ninety days' service is \$21, and ranges up to \$30 for three years.

A WORTHY TRIBUTE

Bobbitt Pays Tribute To The Late Squire John Bailey.

Squire John Bailey, for many years an honored and respected citizen of Lincoln county, died a few days ago near Springfield, Washington county. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Laura Bailey Begley. Hon. Fontaine Fox Bobbitt, a cousin of the deceased pens the following well deserved tribute to him:

Mr. Bailey lived to mature old age. He was an honest and much respected man, wearing the magisterial ermine for many years in Lincoln county, and there was not a stain upon that snow white ermine when he doffed it for the toga of the farmer, his favorite pursuit. In politics or rather in war he was a most gallant Confederate soldier. With the pink of southern chivalry, Gen. John H. Morgan in his Ohio raid and with but 2,500 assisted in capturing 50,000 federal troops and home guards. The Hoosier women would cook great dinners for the home guards, no doubt the sons of the regiment that wanted to borrow the wings of mercury to get away from Buena Vista, while Jeff Davis and a 1,000 gallant Mississippians and Bragg's battery saved the 4,000 American army against Santa Anna's 20,000 lanciers.

Morgan would capture the gallant Hoosiers; and the cook's dinners, then parole the former and eat the latter, and the women would say: "These are not our soldiers, our soldiers are in Virginia." Then the gallant old Clayton Anderson of Gayward, would say: "We are whipping them there worse than these here," and were.

Our beloved Mr. Bailey, was on Perryville, Oct. 8th 1863; 15,000 against 60,000; 4,400 killed and wounded on the federal side; 3,400 killed and wounded on Rebel side. He fought most gallantly in defense of the "Bonny Blue Flag" and desired no more glorious winding sheet than its lovely folds.

In the civil walks of life, a civilian who adorned the life he led, the vocation he followed. As a husband kind, father noble, friend faithful, heart most true, so true to his party, that for years he voted against me (whose first cousin he married) and for my opponent. Though there was no head in Geistes cap, when Squire Bailey was elected.

Judge Sausley had no idea he would ever lose a case in his court. Judge Sausley entered his first court with much pomp and splendor. "I move to dismiss this case," he said. "On what account or grounds?" "No one representing Commonwealth." "I represent the Commonwealth," said Squire Bailey.

Neither Cousin Font Bobbitt, nor Ex-Confederate brother Sausley could swerve this just man from the path of duty.
