The heavy rainfall this summer has played havoc with the early watermelon crop, says John Engleman, who is regarded as an authority on watermelons and canteloupes in this section of the county. Mr. Engleman always has a big patch on the Tate place, on the Hustonville pike near town, and gives it his personal and close attention. He is complaining this season that the rain has caused early melons to fall off the vines before maturity. Canteloupes have been likewise affected, and the crop of both will be greatly curtailed thereby. Home grown melons of both varieties made their appearance on the streets here Wednesday.

J. W. Williams, who generally has a good bunch of bees feeding on his farm out on the Knob Lick pike, five miles from town, bought a couple of 800-pound steers from John Anderson, east of town, this week. He paid a nickel a pound for them and will turn them out on fall grass.

Considerable rivalry exists among a number of the well known tobacco growers of the county as to who will put the finest weed on the market this fall. Farmers out in the Hubble section are claiming that that grown by Shade Wilder on the farm of Senator R. L. Hubble will top 'em all. And now those from west of town are boasting of the fine weed which George Wilder is growing on the farm of Forestus Reid, a couple of miles out on the Hustonville pike. This Mr. Wilder is said to have ten acres of as fine weed as can be found anywhere. Both crops are ready to cut, and the leaves are said to be extraordinary in both quality and size. Estill Carter is personally looking after a small crop on his place in the McCormack's section, and believes he is going to have a crop that will be hard to beat. So many reports of extra good tobacco are heard in Lincoln this season, that the Interior Journal is going to hang up a cash prize for the best four or five hands, a little later, and it will pay the raisers of this crackjack weed to save their best hands for this competition.
