W. T. Bond has bought about 220 900-pound cattle at 5 1-4 to 5 1-2 cents. Carpenter, Lillard & Weil have bought most 1,800 cattle to be shipped at Creek Brook at about 5 1-4 to 5 1-2 cents.—Anderson News.

Bob Moreland's great grey gelding, Nickle Plate was the sensation of the National Horse Show just ended in New York. Moreland sold him for a fancy price to Miss Atterbury, of New York.

Ben Sutton of Garrard sold 2 300 pound hogs to Wesley Sutton at 7 1-2 cents and 3 head of swine to Bob Middleton at a like figure. Jeremiah Blinn sold a 335 pound hog to Henry Cox at 7 1-4 cents and a 300 pound porker to W. G. Anderson at \$7.25.

J. H. Baughman, the local mule buyer, and extensive trader, went to Atlanta early in the week with a carload of mules, which he will sell on the market there. He will devote some time during the winter months to the southern market, which he expects to improve greatly after the first of the year.

C. R. Martin, the local butcher and trader bought ten hogs yesterday in the Hubble neighborhood at 6 1-2 and 6 3-4 cents per pound. He also bought a calf for \$7.50. A Sheriff B. G. Fox purchased 34 head of yearling mules from different Boyle county farmers this week at prices ranging from \$100 to \$110 per head. These mules were shipped to Joseph Kindig, of New York, Penn.—Danville Advocate.

T. W. Jones shipped to Cincinnati market Saturday a carload of hogs averaging 180 pounds. They cost him here 6 to 6 1-4 cents. He also bought of G. Lutes a bunch of yearling cattle weighing about 500 lbs at 5 cents. Jones bought in Laurel county a carload of light cattle which cost him 3 to 4 cents. He shipped them to Cincinnati.

Dr. Al and Charles Rankin, of the Hedgeville section, bought a tract of 50 acres of land from J. H. Otter, last week, for which they paid \$85 an acre. The land adjoins the farm of Dr. Rankin and will make a valuable addition to the large tract which they will farm next year.

The Burley Tobacco Company Friday sold for Goddard & Wells of Mercer county, 4,000 pounds of tobacco at an average of \$25.21 1-2 a hundred. The crop contained two baskets of about 400 pounds each, which brought 39 cents a pound, and one of 400 pounds which sold at 38 cents. This breaks the record of any crop sold in the state so far this season.
