## IN OUR OWN COUNTRY.

New York has a billion dollars' worth of building under way.

The Farmers' National Co-operative company, capital \$50,000,000, filed articles of incorporation in Pierre, South Dakota, recently.

Nowell H. Hargrave, captain of the Yale track team of last spring and a graduate of that university this year, will take charge of the athletic work in the Cincinnati Y. M. C. A. the coming year.

Two carloads of supplies were received by the St. Louis post-office recently from the department at Washington. One contained 5,000,000 postal cards; the other 3,431,000 stamped envelopes, valued at \$61,947.40.

Farmers in Illinois are storing their eggs at central points, where they are candled, placed in trays and stored in vats in a colorless liquid, the ingredients of which are kept secret. The eggs are to be put on the market next winter when the price is high.

Republicans of the Fourth congressional district will not nominate a candidate for congress.


Kentucky's coal output for the last year was 5,324,712 tons, an increase of 304,037 tons over the preceding year.

## JUST A WORD OF EXPLANATION

As to the meaning of the "Householder's Permit," printed below. In receiving young people from distant homes as students, the College promises their parents to put their children into suitable homes here. The College authorities would prefer not to receive a student at all than that he should live in a house where any of the following wise and simple regulations are disregarded. Berea College is grateful to the citizens who open their homes to students, and will do all in its power to see that the householders have considerate treatment by the young people. Householders should confer with Treasurer T. J. Osborne.

### Berea College

Grants to.....this Householder's Permit.

To lodge and board students, not members of his family during the School year, ending with Commencement, June.....

The College on its part agrees to discipline any student who fails to settle with the Householder according to agreement, or to treat him in a respectful manner, and requests prompt notice of any such case.

The Householder promises:—

**Worship:** Each day, after the evening meal (or morning meal if more convenient), religious exercises shall be conducted by the householder or some one appointed by him, in which a portion of Scripture shall be read, a prayer offered, or the company led in repeating the Lord's Prayer in a devout manner. If practicable, a religious song shall be sung.

**Cleanliness:** House and fence shall be kept in neat repair, and yard free from litter. Windows, floors and cooking utensils scrupulously clean. Sheets, pillow-cases and towels to be provided and laundered as often as necessary for healthful conditions. Inspection by College officials will be cheerfully welcomed at any time.

**Food:** Food shall be such as suitable for students, and planned with references to health rather than to please the taste of particular young people. The Matron will seek such advice and instruction as the College can furnish in the matter of wholesome food.

**Departments:** Any complaint regarding the College shall be carried directly to the advising officers of the student concerned, but no conversation shall be allowed among students

or others in the way of unkindly criticism or complaint.

The Matron shall study and understand the Students' Manual, and be faithful in signing reports for girls and for boys under fifteen. The Householder shall also report faithfully and fully when asked concerning the conduct of young men in his home.—BEREA COLLEGE, by T. J. Osborne, Chairman of Committee.

## THE BEGINNING THE BEST TIME TO BEGIN.

You have long planned to go to College, but have never started. In the spring you say, "I shall go next fall sure." In the fall when there is so much work to be done at home you say, "I shall go next winter sure." The seasons go by, and many a young man is too old before he gets started away to College. The fall is the best time to begin for it is the beginning. Nine months of solid consecutive study are better than twelve months of broken schooling. In the fall the weather is fine. By determined effort many a student could be here at the opening who drifts and finally goes into something else, and loses forever his chance at an education.
