FROM THE WIDE WORLD.

Honduras is on the verge of another revolution.

It is said the rupture between the French Government and the Pope is complete.

Russia has protested to Great Britain against the alleged shipment of contraband goods to Japan.

Russia has agreed to fully indemnify German shippers for any losses sustained by the seizures of German ships.

The Venezuelan Government took forcible possession of the property of the New York and Bermudez Asphalt Company, despite many protests. The action is not understood in Washington, and has created unpleasant feeling.

The State Department at Washington has received from the Portland Milling Company, of Oregon, a protest against the seizure by the Russian navy, of a cargo of flour on the steamer Arabia.

M. von Plehve, Russian Minister of the Interior, was assassinated Thursday in St. Petersburg by a bomb, which was thrown at his carriage as he was driving to the Palace to make his weekly report to the Emperor. M. von Plehve's coachman was killed, the man who threw the bomb was probably fatally injured, and twenty people sustained injuries of varying character. The police at St. Petersburg have not been able to establish the identity of the assassin. The funeral of M. von Plehve took place Sunday at St. Petersburg. Bells were tolled throughout the Russian Empire.

IN OUR OWN COUNTRY.

President Roosevelt will visit the World's Fair in October.

The historic "Washington elm," at Morristown, N. J., has been cut down.

The Galveston, Texas, seawall has been completed at a cost of \$1,198,318.

Wisconsin Prohibitionists nominated W. H. Clark, of Ripon, for Governor.

An explosion of natural gas in Russell Park Hotel, Chicago, caused injuries to several people.

Union laborers in a meeting at Pittsburg declared for election of United States Senators by popular vote.

Missouri Republicans in convention at St. Joseph nominated Cyrus P. Walbridge, of St. Louis, for Governor.

Thomas W. Tichenal, a West Virginia postmaster, has been arrested on the charge of working a green goods scheme.

Military rule is at an end in Colorado, Gov. Peabody having called in the soldiers who were on duty in the Cripple Creek district.

Thomas Taggart, of Indiana, was elected Chairman, and Urey Woodson, of Kentucky, Secretary of the National Democratic Committee.

Custer Gardner, murderer of Squire and David Osborne, was executed at Mumfordsville, Hart County.

John D. White has withdrawn from the race for the Republican nomination for Congress in the Eleventh district.

W. H. Rousey, who escaped jail at Danville last October, after having been sentenced to twenty-one years in the penitentiary for killing Sam Mastin in 1902, has been arrested in California and will be brought back to Kentucky.

The Mayor of Monroe, Mich., has invited the Kentucky State officials to be guests of that city on Sept. 1, to witness the unveiling of the monument erected by the State of Michigan to the Kentucky soldiers who fell in the battle of the River Raisin in 1813. Gov. Beckham, on behalf of the Kentucky State officials, has accepted the invitation.

State Auditor Hager declines to place any part of the income from the Insurance Department to the credit of the school fund until first directed to do so by the courts. He declares that such an action would derange the present tax rate, which would have to be reapportioned by the Legislature. Superintendent of Public Instruction Fuqua will institute a friendly suit against Auditor Hager, to compel him to make the appointment.



CHINESE BOMBPROOFS IN PORT ARTHUR.

Ever since that fearsome day in February when the guns of Admiral Togo's vessels thundered a vociferous demand for admission to the harbor of Port Arthur the Chinese in the beleaguered town have been in a condition bordering on panic. They immediately constructed little huts which they appear to regard as bombproofs. In these they sleep oblivious of the fact that scores of them have been destroyed by the shells thrown into the town.

2. That we condemn the action of the Legislature in repealing the law allowing teachers pay when attending Institutes, and we ask that the teachers be required to attend the Institute free of charge to them.
3. That we congratulate Supt. Eager upon his wise selection of Prof. Burke as Instructor, and for the fair and impartial manner in which he has presided over this Institute.
