The program will be crowded with interest. Dr. Herget, the great Baptist preacher of Cincinnati, President Bahney of Cincinnati University, and other important speakers are to be here, besides Dr. Crabbe of Eastern Kentucky Normal, Dr. Cherry of Western Kentucky Normal, Miss Cora Wilson Stewart, and superintendents and preachers from our mountain counties.

These conferences have been of the greatest value for inspiration, instruction and fellowship, and it is hoped that every county will be represented by both Christian and school men this year. TO PARENTS IN BEREA Berea College in all of its departments is overcrowded in the winter. This will provide for the girls of the Vocational and Foundation Schools. They will live at first in a number of dwelling houses already occupying this part of town, and later will have additional new buildings; it is hoped. This new campus area will be dedicated by a gathering in the Baptist Church on Sunday, September 5th, at 3 p. m., and all the citizens of Berea and vicinity are invited to be present. A map will be prepared showing the new location of streets and buildings. There will be music and a good social time. Let everybody be there.
