**NEGOTIATING FOR NAVAL BASE.**

Washington.—Information was forthcoming from an authoritative source that Japan has renewed her attempts to obtain a footing on the western hemisphere. At the present moment, it was stated on high authority, Japan is negotiating with Colombia for the purchase of a site on her coast. These negotiations are of comparatively recent origin, it is said, and follow the failure of Japan to consummate a similar bargain with the Republic of Panama.
