Mexico City, March 21.—Subsecretary of Communication Bonillas announced in an interview published in El Democrita that after a conference with Carranza and at Carranza's desire he has revoked all concessions for building railroads granted under the Huerta regime and the convention administration. This action has been taken that preference may be given to Mexican capital in granting railway concessions. It is Carranza's belief that the railroads of the country should be controlled by Mexicans.
