TOWN OF WESTMOUNT USES GARBAGE AS THE FUEL FOR ITS LIGHTING PLANT.

The town of Westmount is a suburb of the City of Montreal, having its own municipal government and being in all respects an independent borough.

In 1904 the authorities began an investigation of existing means for disposal, and received from Mr. F. L. Fellows, borough engineer, an exhaustive report, giving full details of collection service, quantity and character of wastes, estimated costs for improved system, and recommending the use of a parcel of land owned by the borough at St. Catharine's street and Landsdowne avenue for the erection of a combined electric lighting and refuse disposal station.

The most modern and best approved types of generators boilers and destructor were recommended; the whole equipment to be of the highest class, with provisions for additions to the plant for future extension of the lighting service.

The excavations for the foundations were begun in October and the work was continued through the winter of 1905-6 under the many difficulties attending the construction of brickwork in Canadian winter climate.

Nixon's New Naval Scout Detects Torpedoes and Submarine Boats.

New York, May 29.—A new submarine destroyer from which the crew can see sights and hear sounds at a great distance, and thus strike with greater accuracy, has been invented by Lewis Nixon the shipbuilder.

Asks United States to Take Hand In Settling the Election Troubles.

Colon, May 29.—The municipal council of Panama in extraordinary session held May 24 unanimously adopted a declaration to the effect that in certain quarters plans were being carried out to prevent free and fair action on the part of voters at the coming election in Panama, and asking the United States to intervene to insure to the people of Panama their constitutional rights.

KENTUCKY NEWSLETS

A small dwelling house belonging to Mrs. Josie Hedge, in Mayfield, was completely destroyed by fire about 3 o'clock Sunday morning.

Another attempt to rob the store house of J. H. Ivey of Harvey, Marshall county, was made last Thursday night but the robbers were thwarted from their attempt by Mr. Ivey who fired one time with a pistol.

All the cases against violation of the Sunday closing law in Louisville were continued in the police court by Judge McCann until Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock.

The Bluegrass graded school tournament came to an end at Harrodsburg, the meeting being one of the most successful ever held in the state.

Texas detectives have been asked to look for J. B. Overall, a wealthy resident of Cecilian, Ky., who disappeared while on his way to Texas to be at the bedside of his dying wife.

Indictments charging murder, the crime alleged to have been committed in 1900, have been returned in Pineville against C. D. Ball and his son, W. Patton Ball.

Jerry A. Sullivan of Richmond, yesterday announced that he will not be a candidate for the democratic nomination for congress from the Eighth district.

Senator Joseph W. Bailey, of Texas, one of the most prominent constitutional lawyers in the country, was engaged yesterday as counsel for the Kentucky state racing commission in its fight with the Western Jockey club.

At the 10:30 o'clock mass at St. Louis Bertrand's church Louisville, Sunday morning a letter was read from the master general of the Order of St. Dominic, the Very Rev. Hyacinth M. Cormier, of Rome, in which the apostolic blessing was given by Pope Pius X. to the choir attached to this church, which sings exclusively Gregorian music.
