Louisville Mayor Promulgates Stringent Order.

Hotels Serve Drinks Only With Meals and Sandwich Is No Excuse for Proprietor.

WITNESSES WILL BE CAUGHT.

Louisville, June 16.—That Mayor Barth and the board of public safety intend strictly to enforce the law forbidding the sale of intoxicating liquors on Sunday was further evidenced today when the most stringent order yet issued was promulgated by the board to the police department.

The order directs the police to close the saloons found open and to arrest the offenders who may be engaged in selling intoxicants. It also directs that the names of the witnesses—that is those who take a drink—be reported to the board so that prosecutions can be made. The taking away of licenses in case of being caught in the act is also foreshadowed.

The police are directed to go to the baseball park and take the names of the ticket sellers, gate keepers and all who are engaged in the game in order that they may be proceeded against in the courts under the penal statutes.

The order provides that hotels may be allowed to sell drinks with meals, but not with sandwiches. The hotel keepers are warned not to try to evade the law in the matter of selling drinks with anything but regular meals.

GOT THE PICTURE. Courier-Journal's Threat Effective With Lyon County Matron.

Mrs. Caswell, hostess for Lyon county at the Louisville Home-Coming celebrations, is averse to newspaper notoriety and refused to give her photograph to the papers. The Louisville Courier-Journal tried several times to procure a likeness but failed. Finally in desperation it sent Mrs. Bennett a telegram reading: "If you do not send a photo we will use cut of Lydia Pinkham and put your name under it." This brought the desired effect. Mrs. Bennett procured a photograph from a relative in Eddyville, but it was one of many years ago and bears little resemblance to Mrs. Bennett now. Mrs. Bennett is a cousin of Captain G. C. Crumbaugh, of this city, and has often visited here.

WITH SHOT GUN. Magistrate Says Milton Brooks Threatened Him.

Milton Brooks, colored, yesterday was arrested and will be tried Monday in Magistrate Charles W. Emery's court for resisting an officer. Magistrate B. F. This condition has been brought about by the state law going into effect the other day. Manager John Watts says "nary" a jug can come through the express office from the city by the river, though a great many people, who have not yet learned, come there to order a jug as usual.

All booze coming in now hails from Cairo, Ill., Jackson Tenn., or Memphis, and from either place it requires two days' time to get it. Notwithstanding this strenuous state law and the present sealed-up condition of things, whisky firms in Paducah have sent cards to a great many Mayfield patrons and others saying that their orders will still be promptly attended to. It is supposed that they mean that the orders will be filled at Jackson, Tenn., or other points out of the state.
