RAILROAD NOTES

The Illinois Central passenger depot in Paducah is to have adequate steam heating facilities. This time the improvement is assured, and within the next few weeks the boiler will be set up and the plant made ready for service before fall sets in.

Roadmaster F. L. Thompson, of the Louisville division, was in the city today and stated that authority for the work had been received and that this time it is a sure go. This will be pleasant news to the traveling public even if it does come when anything but artificial heat is being thought of.

The present boiler is too small to furnish steam for the entire depot, and for three years the depot has been cold during the winter. Last winter stoves were used, and the road finally saw the necessity of the immediate installation of an adequate plant.

"We will let the contract for the work just as soon as we have made definite arrangements as to what we want," Roadmaster Thompson stated this morning. "The intention is to put in a boiler across from the depot at one end of the ice house, and run pipes to the depot. Coaches left here for cleaning will be heated before the engine is coupled by steam from the boiler. The improvement will serve to other purposes than merely heating the depot."

No decision will be reached by the managers of the various railroads operating in Kentucky upon what action will be taken upon the ruling of the Kentucky railroad commission until the early part of next week. The railroad attorneys who agreed the case have turned the report of the commission over to the traffic managers of the roads, and a force of clerks will be at once started to work figuring out just what the decision means to the roads, and how much the revenue will be decreased by the forced lowering of rates.

The probabilities are strong that the Louisville & Nashville road and the Illinois Central road will resist the decision of the commission by an appeal to the courts. This will be in the form of a motion for an injunction.

Thomas McKinley, a switchman employed by the Illinois Central at Central City, was yesterday struck by two stray bullets from revolvers used by two strangers fighting in the Central City yards. One bullet struck the right side and another the left wrist. Both are serious wounds. McKinley was brought here and placed in the Illinois Central hospital at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.
