**DYING HORSE IN HARDWARE STORE**  
Walks Through, Hunting a Quiet Death Bed.

Animal Escaped From Drive of L. P. Harris, of the Cairo Road, Well-Known Driver.

**INJURED ITSELF JUMPING**  
Just seeking a place in which to die in comfort, was a horse that walked sedately through Henneberger's hardware store, 422 Broadway, this morning about 10 o'clock, to the astonishment of the corps of clerks and a hundred pedestrians, who stopped to gaze at the intrepid beast. Those who followed it through the building saw it turn east in the alley and finally lie down and expire behind the East Tennessee Telephone building on Fourth street.

The horse belonged to L. T. Harris, a farmer, residing on the Cairo road, who brought a drove into a sale stable this morning.

While Mr. Harris was driving the horses toward the city this one got away and jumped a fence. The last owner saw of the animal it was galloping down the road to Paducah. He came to the city with the remainder of the drove and, after stabling them, started out to look for the stray. He found it dead in the alley.

Evidently it had injured itself jumping over the fence, and when it reached Fifth street and Broadway was so exhausted it sought any opening that led off the paved street. The Henneberger store looked inviting and the horse entered the front door and walked quietly through to the alley.

The horse was valued at \$100.

**NEWS OF KENTUCKY**

**Need Farm Labor.**  
Lexington Ky., Aug. 31.—The subject of labor supply, with special reference to farm work, may be taken up at the next meeting of the Farmers' club. The fact that complaint is general on the part of the farmers of Fayette county about the great difficulty of procuring even as much as 60 per cent of the labor that is imperatively needed to take care of the different crops at the time they most need attention, has assumed such a serious stage that there is a feeling more or less grave concerning as to the future of the farming interests in the county. Some instances have been related, though not all confined to this county, in which farmers have sold, or attempted to sell, their farms because they found it impossible to raise crops profitably, owing to the difficulty of procuring labor. Within the last two weeks complaints have been multiplying. Hemp and tobacco are both in need of attention. \$2.00 a day and board are offered for tobacco labor and \$4.00 an acre for cutting hemp. These prices provide fair compensation, but idleness seems more attractive to a number of the class referred to.

**Tobacco at Cadiz.**  
Cadiz, Ky., August 31.—Another break of the association tobacco in the Cadiz Storage house was made of 64 hogsheads by Inspector Quarles, of Hopkinsville. The tobacco in this break was of low grade, the most of it being lugs. The recent decision of Manager Ewing to advance the price of medium and good leaf about 50 cents on the hundred will be good news to our farmers, as nearly all of the tobacco that has yet been sold here is of a low grade, and most of the good tobacco is still in the storage house. Since last week 39 hogsheads of tobacco have been sold. It was all lugs and common leaf, and the prices ranged from \$5.25 to \$6.00 for lugs and \$6.50 to \$8.00 for the leaf. The number of hogsheads received at the storage house this season has now reached 850, and new tobacco is coming in every day.

**Fine Residence Burns.**  
Mayfield, Ky., August 31.—The dwelling house of Mr. Gabe R. Allen, at the extreme end of Broadway was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night about 9 o'clock. The direct origin of the fire is unknown but the popular supposition is that it caught from some remnants of fire left by tinners in burning pitch in an up-story room in the afternoon. There was no one about the premises and as the blaze was first discovered in the roof. On the building alone there was \$3,000 insurance and on the household goods \$1,000 insurance. The property lost is valued at much more.

**Republicans of Second.**  
Owensboro, Ky., August 31.—The Owensboro congressional committee of the Second congressional district of Kentucky, has been called to meet at Dawson Springs on Wednesday, September 5, 1906, at 2 o'clock. The committee consists of the chairman of the executive committees of the various counties composing the district, which are Henderson, Hopkins and Christian. The object of the meeting has not been given out. It is not known what the Republicans will do with respect to making a nomination for congress. Webster

**MEMPHIS CONCERN GIVEN CONTRACT**  
Lowest Bidders on The Street Paving Estimates.

Galesburg Vitrified Brick Will Be Used in the Construction of Surface.

The Memphis Asphalt & Paving company of Memphis Tenn., was yesterday afternoon awarded the contract for building brick streets in Paducah and the contract will be signed Monday and the work started into without delay.

The bids of the three companies were presented to the board of public works yesterday afternoon by City Engineer L. A. Washington, who figured the bids carefully. The successful bidder's figures are \$29,788.82 against \$32,574.13, the highest, from Hines & Bowlin.

The board of public works will report the acceptance of the contract to the general council at a special meeting to be called Monday, at which the secretary of the company will be present to sign the necessary papers. It is the intention of the company to finish the work by December 31.

The Galesburg vitrified brick was adopted by the board.

City Solicitor James Campbell, Jr., is engaged today in preparing the contract for the city and the company to sign. As soon as this is done Mayor Yeiser will call the general council in special session to ratify the action of the board of public works. Unless the fact that it is Labor Day makes the action illegal, Mayor Yeiser will call the board of aldermen for that afternoon at 2 o'clock. In the event the contract is signed in the meantime, and let the board of councilmen act that night.

The company agrees to commence the work within ten days.
