

# JAS. BREATHITT NOT A CANDIDATE

### He Does Not Seek Nomination For Governor.

Mayor Schuerman, of Carrollton, Chosen to Oppose Rhinock in Sixth District.

## TOBACCO BARN DESTROYED

Hopkinsville Ky., Sept. 11.—Judge James Breathitt, who has been strongly urged for some time to announce himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor of Kentucky, and who has had the matter under consideration, today publicly announced that he would not become a candidate.

### Weden O'Neal Is Dead.

Cincinnati, O., Sept. 11.—Weden O'Neal, former United States marshal of Kentucky, and one of the best known criminal lawyers of the Bluegrass State, died at 8:30 this morning at his home on the Lexington pike, back of Covington.

### Bloody Fight.

Munfordsville, Ky., Sept. 11.—Reports have reached here that in a fight near Dennison Sam Doyle was shot and instantly killed, and his brother, Russell Doyle, seriously injured. B. Sturgeon and the Doyles engaged in the railroad tie business. The fight is said to be the outgrowth of an old quarrel.

### Sat Down on Track.

Maysville, Ky., Sept. 11.—James Wilson, an employe of the cotton mills, sat down on the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad tracks last night, and No. 4 passenger train cut off his right leg.

### Tobacco Barn Burned.

Mt. Sterling, Ky., Sept. 11.—The large stock and tobacco barn of J. H. Henry, near Aaron's Run, this county, was totally destroyed by fire of incendiary origin. About 10,000 pounds of tobacco, feed, hay and farming implements were destroyed. The loss is a heavy one. It is believed Mr. Henry incurred the hatred of the lawless element by appearing as witness in circuit court here. The citizens of that community are much wrought up over the crime.

### Schuerman to Oppose Rhinock.

Cincinnati, Sept. 11.—In a delegate convention held at Turner Hall, Covington, this afternoon shortly after 12, Republicans of the Sixth district with unanimity and harmony that have been absent in recent years, nominated the young mayor, William F. Schuerman of Carrollton, Carroll county, Ky., as standard-bearer in the race for congress against Congressman Joseph L. Rhinock.

## MAKE DASH

### AND ESCAPE FROM GUARDS OF COUNTY JAIL.

### Negro Prisoner Eludes Pursuit With Shackles on His Legs—Is Still at Liberty.

Will Bowling and Charles Jones, colored, who were given six months' sentence in the county jail for stealing merchandise from an Illinois Central box car made a dash for liberty yesterday afternoon between 3 and 4 o'clock and Bowling was successful. Jones immediately was caught.

They were hampered by shackles about their ankles, and to run the negroes had to throw the chains over their shoulders. Jailor James Eaker was working them under guard in the yard cutting grass when the dash was made. Jones was caught by the guard a short distance from the court house. He was found hiding in an outhouse.

If Bowling succeeded in ridding himself of the shackles, his safety is probable.

Bowling is still at large and Jailor Eaker has set about to effect his capture. He has written descriptions to several neighboring towns where Bowling will likely go. It is presumed he succeeded in filing the chains off his ankles.

### DIRECTORS RESTORE LOSS.

### Millions Pledged Will Enable Philadelphia Concern to Reopen.

Philadelphia, Sept. 11.—All the directors of the Real Estate Trust company, which was wrecked by its suicide president, Frank K. Hipple, principally through heavy loans made to Adolf Segal, a promoter, on flimsy collateral, have agreed to Receiver Earl's plan for reorganizing the company. The directors are to contribute the amount deemed necessary by the receiver. "This money is given absolutely," said Mr. Earle, "without promise of return or security. The directors are putting up the money from their own pockets to make up the losses which have been sustained through the bad Segal loans."

The loans made to Segal by President Hipple aggregate more than \$5,000,000, and his securities are believed to be worth about \$2,000,000. Consequently the directors will subscribe something more than \$3,000,000. A statement issued last night by Rev. Dr. Roberts, clerk of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church, announces that in addition to the \$30,000 of the funds of the trustees of the church which were lost in the collapse, deposits amounting to about \$130,000 are also involved.

The Indians are home again but will remain but a short time. In fact Quigley left the team at Vincennes, Platt went to Decatur, Ill. In the Three I league at noon, Perry and Haas will go home tonight and the others will follow before the week is out.

"We had bad luck and this is the whole story," Chief Lloyd explained. "We had a good bunch but struck the grade late in the season. Platt has gone to Decatur for the remainder of the season but I hold his contract, he having signed the reserve. In fact, I have all my men reserved. Louisville wants to buy Sammy Wright but I do not know whether we can come to terms. Eddie Taylor and Freddie Miller will leave tomorrow or Thursday for their home in Ironton, Quigley is barn-storming with Eddie Kolb and a star lineup from the Kitty through Indiana and Ohio. We received word from Grover Land that he will be here on September 20 and will probably go into business here this winter. Land has done well with Toledo this season and will have a better berth next year. He is popular in the American association. He is tipped a corner for the big leagues. Land has been hitting left handed this season and will hit around the 300 mark."

Lloyd says that there will be a Kitty league next season and that the chances are in favor of Paducah being in it. He thinks if the present franchise holders do not want to plunge again, others will make the attempt if given an opportunity.

### Kolb's All-Star Aggregation.

Eddie Kolb has selected an all-star team to play through Indiana and Ohio. 
