### WAS SCALED TO DEATH.

John Harvey, Grieving at Loss of Daughter, Killed by Hot Bath.

Los Angeles, Sept. 20.—John Harvey, a millionaire coal operator of Denver and Leadville, died at the Hotel Lankershim yesterday as the result of a bath, taken either voluntarily or by accident, in water heated almost to the boiling point. Harvey died in great agony. He had been at the Lankershim for two months and had been melancholy since the sudden death of his daughter about a year ago.

### PRETENDS TO BE SON OF SHAW

American Arrested in France Poses as Relative of Cabinet Officer.

Toulon, Sept. 20.—Herbert Shaw, a young American arrested here yesterday on a charge of fraud, today said he was a son of Leslie M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury of the United States. He said his arrest was made without any charge having been made against him. He had no papers to establish his identity. The American consul finally secured his release.

### RAILROAD PROPERTY

Is Still Being Destroyed by Cuban Insurgents.

Havana, Sept. 20.—Since the return here of the military trains the rebels are again destroying property of the Cuban Western railroad, a British enterprise. The important bridge at Santa Cruz, near Taco Taco, and smaller bridges in that district likewise have been wrecked. Trains run only as far as Artemisa, and there is no telegraphic communication beyond that point.

### PEONAGE.

Bill With Twenty-five Counts Found Against Knoxville Contractor.

Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 20.—Robert B. Oliver, railroad contractor of this city, was today indicted by the federal grand jury in session here on the charge of peonage. The indictment contained twenty-five counts. The defendant is a brother of W. J. Oliver, also an extensive railroad contractor.

### Burglars at Butler.

Butler, Ky., Sept. 20.—Burglars visited Butler last night and robbed the postoffice and drug store. They stole Dr. Yelton's rig and escaped. A posse found the horse in an exhausted condition today near Fortera.

## BAVARIAN KINGS GIVEN TO EXCESS

All Have Gone Mad Through Over Indulgence.

Otto, Mad King, Never Trusted Alone, But Reigns Without Hindrance by People.

### HISTORY OF ROYAL FAMILY

Munich, Sept. 20.—Romance writers have told the world that a mysterious curse hangs over the Wittelbach dynasty, which has ruled Bavaria for seven centuries, but it is very largely the result of dissipation—wine, women and extravagant indulgence. I have seen it called "a gigantic sorrow," "the atrocity of fate," "the awesome breath of the Almighty," and by other large and stately terms, but this perpetual tragedy of a nation would not have occurred if the Ludwigs and Ottos had left wine and women alone; if they had gone to bed at 10 o'clock at night and got up to breakfast at 8 o'clock in the morning, and worked all day like honest men, instead of imitating the emperors of Rome in the gratification of their depraved tastes and sensuous appetites. And they should have done this, being aware that there had been signs of insanity among their ancestors as long ago as Frederick Christian, who reigned in the earlier part of the eighteenth century.

Otto, the present king, is so crazy that he is not trusted alone, and the newspapers occasionally publish a report that the parliament intends to depose him and appoint a successor, but although his mind is entirely gone, and he does not know right from wrong, or light from darkness, Otto will be allowed to reign over Bavaria as long as he lives, through Prince Luitpold, his uncle, the regent, who is 80 years old, but in perfect health and as vigorous physically and mentally as a man of 50. He does not meddle with politics, and has been an admirable executive. If anything happens to the king he will be elected to succeed him. If the king should outlive his uncle, the regent, Prince Ludwig Charles, will ascend the throne. He is the oldest son of Luitpold, and his wife, the Archduchess Maria Theresa, believed by many to be entitled to the throne of England because her grandfather had a better title than Queen Victoria. There seems to be no intention among any of the political parties to agitate the question of the retirement of Otto or the succession. Everybody is satisfied with the status quo.

The authentic history of Bavaria runs back to 500 B. C., but really begins with Charlemagne, whose grandson, Arnulf, governed the kingdom and elevated Luitpold, Count of Scheuern, ancestor of the present dynasty, to the rank of margrave. This was in 1907, A. D., and the Wittelbachers have been in power ever since.

### WILL BE BURIED HERE.

Telegram to Brother of C. B. Byers Asks for Picture.

A telegram was received last night at 9 o'clock by Jim Byers, brother of C. B. Byers, who was found dead in his bunk yesterday morning on the steamer Lookout, from his parents, in Woodburn Ore., requesting that the body be buried here and that a photograph be taken of it and sent to them.

Coroner Eaker held an inquest over the body yesterday afternoon and a verdict of "natural death by unknown causes" was given. The funeral of C. B. Byers will take place this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Broadway Methodist church, the Rev. T. J. Newell officiating. Burial will be at Oak Grove cemetery.

### BIG COAL MERGER UNDER WAY.

New England and British Capitalists Seek Properties in Cape Breton.

Boston, Sept. 20.—Henry M. Whitney of this city, B. F. Pearson, of Halifax, and other New England and British capitalists, are planning a merger of all the coal properties in the maritime provinces still independent of the Dominion Coal company, which has hitherto dominated the Cape Breton colliery business. A new shipping point, Port Merien, will be opened. Its harbor is open all the year round.
