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GOOD PLATFORM IS RECORD MADE

Councilmen, Aldermen and School Trustees.

Will Be Endorsed by Renomination at Hands of the Republican Convention.

DEMOCRATS ARE INTERESTED.

Next Thursday the Republican city convention will be held in the council chamber at the city hall.

Indications are that the attendance will be large, while a great contingent of the Democratic party is watching the result to learn who will be nominated for city judge. The rest of the ticket affords little opportunity for speculation, because members of the general council and school trustees will receive the endorsement of a second term, if they desire it or are willing to make the race.

The record of this general council without exception has been the most progressive, free from suggestion of extravagance or corruption, and the most intelligent in the history of the city. A review of its work, and a glance at the municipal improvements going on, indicate the kind of platform the Republican councilmanic ticket will have to run on.

Never has Paducah looked as well as she does now. More comments on her appearance, all due to the improved streets, and sidewalks, the removal of fences and the example set property owners by the city, have been heard recently than ever before. President McBroom, of the First ward, and Councilmen Oehlschlaeger, of the Second ward; Kolb, of the Third ward; Katterjohn, of the Fourth ward; Hill, of the Fifth ward, and Barnett, of the Sixth ward will have no opposition if they will accept renominations.

In the Fourth ward, where Councilman Dipple resigned, F. S. Johnston probably will be nominated as running mate with Councilman Katterjohn. Mr. Johnston is a member of the Johnston-Denker Coal Co.

The same may be said of President O. B. Starks, of the board of aldermen, and Aldermen E. E. Bell, John Farley and W. T. Miller.

There seems to be no question that the party will accord unanimous renomination to President Williamson, of the school board, and trustees H. Gallman, of the First ward; W. H. Piteher, of the Third ward; P. Beckenbach, of the Fourth ward; L. Peter, of the Fifth ward, and Dr. J. S. Troutman, of the Sixth ward.

HAD BRIDLE

And This Got Stick and Basket Man in Trouble.

Alexander Montgomery, a "stick and basket" man, was arrested this morning by Patrolmen Thad Terrell and James Brennan with a well filled basket of junk he had picked up. The principal part of the junk was above suspicion, but when Montgomery displayed a bridle, he was promptly "nabbed." Coming down Broadway with a basket filled with whisky bottles of all sizes and shapes, and spoons with other articles, Montgomery presented an unusual spectacle. He used a stick to poke about in refuse piles and secured the bridle back of the city hall in the tin house used to store city harness. He is charged with petit larceny.
