What the Illinois Central Must Pay for Sewers Here.

Final computation of the expense of the new sewer in district No. 2, to the Illinois Central railroad, the largest single property holder in the district, estimates it at approximately \$19,000. This is about 20 per cent of the entire cost of the improvement. The Illinois Central owns considerable waste ground, consisting of hollows, besides its terminals and shops.
