RESIST EFFORTS TO COLLECT TAX

Will Not Pay Bonds For Railroad Never Built

Woman Lives, Although Bullet Severed Her Spinal Cord, Which Is Sewed Up.

SHOT FOR NOT GOING TO BED.

Olive Hill Ky., Dec. 28.—Heavily armed and marching with the precision of trained troops a mob of 1,000 men took possession of Olive Hill Monday morning, and by force of the weapons they carried forced the collector of taxes to surrender a stock of merchandise on which he had levied for taxes. Determined to prevent the collection of either principal or interest on railroad bonds issued sixty years ago, for the construction of a railroad which was never built, the men of Carter and Elliott counties have resorted to arms and have formed themselves into a sort of Ku Klux Klan, the members of which are pledged to stand together, and, if necessary, fight for what they believe to be their rights.

Spinal Cord Severed. Lexington, Ky., Dec. 28.—Although her spinal cord was cut in two by the bullet which Charles Stewart fired into her back Monday night, Miss Susie Nelson is still alive, with her body paralyzed below the wound. The bullet was located this evening by Prof. Pence, of the State college, with an X-ray machine. It was found embedded in the backbone and had completely severed the spinal cord. The bullet was removed by the surgeons at the Good Samaritan hospital and the spinal cord was stitched together.

Stewart, who shot Miss Nelson and another boarder at the house of his sister Monday night, because they did not obey his orders to go to bed and cease talking, has not yet been caught.

Western Kentucky Situation. Louisville, Dec. 28.—Chairman McChord, of the Kentucky railroad commission, will again take up the matter of the car shortage, especially as applied to the western part of the state. It is Mr. McChord's idea to discuss the matter with both the shippers and railroad men. Mr. McChord has not yet decided what date he will hold the conference.

Parted Just as Wife Hauled Husband and Boy From Ice.

Morristown, N. J., Dec. 28.—Before the eyes of his young wife, George Davis, aged 25, today lost his life in an unsuccessful attempt to rescue John A. Arke, aged 8, from drowning. Davis and his wife saw Arke break through the ice and drop into the water. Lying down with rope about him, Davis seized Arke. His wife hauled on the rope and drew her husband back from the hole until the boy was out of the water. As she pulled again the rope broke and the man and boy slid back into the water and were drowned.

WHALERS KIDNAP GIRLS OF ALASKA

Are Caught By Revenue Cutter And Held

Crime Is Unprecedented in History of America and Jurisdiction in Dispute.

PORT ALASKA IN MOUING

Washington, D. C., Dec. 28.—Reminiscent of the days when the Sabine women were carried off is the story told here today of a looting and woman-stealing raid of American whalers in faraway Alaska. The story reached the department of justice by way of Seattle.

According to the report, several masters of American whaling vessels in Arctic waters captured a lot of the prettiest Alaskan girls they could find at a settlement known as Port Alaska and put to sea.

The shrieks of the mothers and sisters on shore were in vain. The matter was reported officially to the United States authorities in Alaska. The revenue cutter McCullough was sent in pursuit and succeeding in overhauling the whalers and rescuing the captives.

One Charged With Murder.

The girls were put ashore at the point from which they had been stolen and the question at once arose whether the Alaskan court had jurisdiction. Telegrams were sent to the department of justice and it was eventually decided that the whalers should be taken to Seattle. There the point was made that the whalers should be tried at the "first jurisdiction" at which they touched.

Judge Hanford at Seattle declared that he could hold the prisoners, as Seattle was the first "legal jurisdiction" and he was sustained by the department of justice. The trial will go on there. The principal defendant in the case is E. W. Newth, captain of one of the whaling vessels. Another master, named Bodfish, is charged with murder.

Crime Unprecedented.

The prosecution will be vigorous as the Alaskans are still wards of the nation and the crime is unprecedented in the United States. The affair has aroused officials of the department of justice and instructions are being prepared for the trial.

The revenue cutter had a long chase and in the running fight one of the pursuers was killed and around this swings the charge of murder.
