# G. N. FEATHERSTON PROPERTY IS SOLD

Assignee Brand Disposes of Stock of Groceries

Tobacco Sales at Mayfield—Big Onion Farm—Fine Reception—Little Child Dies.

IS BITTEN BY COPPERHEAD.

Mayfield, Ky., July 20.—Assignee Art Brand sold the stock of groceries recently owned by G. N. Featherston, Friday afternoon, to W. A. Usher for \$1,160. This stock was invoiced at over \$2,200 and was bought in by Mr. Usher for the above named price.

**Onion Farm.** Ed Hodge, of the Folsomdale section, was in the city Friday with 20 bushels of onions for which he sold readily at \$1 per bushel. Mr. Hodge had 38 rows of onions across his garden which gave him a prolific yield, from which he may realize over \$50.

**Tobacco Sales.** Another excellent sale was made Friday by the Dark Tobacco association of 119 hogsheads. Of this number ten were lugs that brought from \$6 to \$6.75 per hundred. Of the leaf, 100 hogsheads sold as follows: Four at \$8; 4 at \$8.50; 1 at \$8.75; 16 at \$9; 2 at \$9.25; 29 at \$9.50; 16 at \$10; 10 at \$10.50; 10 at \$11; 1 at \$11.50, and 2 at \$11.50.

At the present rate of selling it will only be a short time until all the tobacco at Mayfield shall have been disposed of.

**Bitten By Snake.** Mr. John Morgan Wilson, one of our popular road contractors, had the misfortune of being bitten on the left leg Thursday afternoon near West Plains by a copperhead snake, from the effects of which he was very sick for quite awhile.
