SCHOOL NOTES

Praises Professor Evans.

The Hopkinsville Kentuckian says of the science teacher recently elected in the Paducah High school: "Prof. William A. Evans, who as one of the teachers in the High school has made such a splendid record during the year he has been here, is to leave Hopkinsville to the profound regret of patrons of the High school and of the pupils themselves. No teacher in the schools has ever made a more creditable record in one year, or ex-

ercised a more wholesome influence over the pupils, boys especially, in the High school. He has developed athletics, ruled by kindness and instilled into the larger boys a fondness for their school work that has been remarkable. That he is to leave this work is a serious blow to the schools."

The New Era says: Prof. William A. Evans, of the Hopkinsville High school, one of the most popular and efficient teachers ever connected with the institution, has been elected a member of the Paducah schools at a flattering salary, and has announced his acceptance of the position. If his decision is the matter is final it will be a blow to the local school and will occasion general regret among the citizens. Prof. Evans' services here have been of the highest order. He is an educator of fine ability and his influence on the young people has always been elevating and inspiring. A young man and a trained athlete, he has been able to enter heartily and actively into the sports of the boys and has made the physical culture department of the High school as excellent as any in the state, while that indefinable something called the school spirit is unequalled in the annals of the town. This, too, he has accomplished without losing a whit of the respect or deference of his young charges. Professor Evans is an all round good man, and it would be a pity for the school to have to give him up.

Receive Recommendations Regarding Amusement.

Adopt Resolution Urging Adoption of Littlefield Bill By Congress—Interesting Reports.

CHURCH EXTENSION REPORT

Baltimore, May 8.—Bishop Goodsell, of Boston, was easily the central figure of the session of the quadrennial general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church by reason of the fact that it was he who read the address of the bishops and that this address contained this time matter of unusual importance. Although its expressions relative to the liquor question evoked the greatest enthusiasm, doubtless its most important sentences were those embracing the recommendations for bishops touching paragraph 248 of the church discipline relating to amusements.

The address recommends that from paragraph 248 certain words, indicated, but not quoted in the address, be stricken out.

The exact words are "dancing, playing at games of chance, attending theaters, horse races, circuses, dancing parties or patronizing dancing schools."

This recommendation is followed immediately by a declaration of the bishops that grave injustice will be done if their recommendation is interpreted as an abandonment of the early opposition to worldly amusements and that is, return to the principles and exact words of John Wesley.

The immediate outcome of the bishops' treatment of the liquor question was the adoption of a resolution favorable to the Littlefield interstate liquor shipment bill now before congress, which resolution is to be laid before Speaker Cannon by a committee tomorrow.

Last night a meeting was held in celebration of the centenary of the organization of the general conference as a delegated body and of the adoption of the constitution of the Methodist Episcopal church. There was a distinguished gathering also at the banquet of the Brotherhood of St. Paul.

Board of Extension Report.

"We think that the present general conference should order that the Sunday school collections during the coming quadrennium should be evenly divided between the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and the Board of Foreign Missions."

Milwaukee, Wis., May 8.—A special from Waupaca, Wis., says: The letter which Carl Peterson, of Waupaca, received from Mrs. Guinness, the alleged LaPorte murderess, has been translated from Norwegian into English. While other translations may differ in only the minor details the following is practically the correct substance: "Carl Peterson, Waupaca, Wis. Dear Sir: As I some time ago received from you a letter in answer to my ad. in the Scandinavian, I will, with pleasure, answer the same. The reason I waited for some time is that there has been other answers to the same ad. As many as fifty have been received and it has been impossible to answer all. I have picked out the most respectable, and I have decided that yours is such. "First, I will tell you that I am a Norwegian and have been in this country for twenty years. I live in Indiana about fifty-nine miles from Chicago and one mile north of LaPorte. I am the sole owner of a nice home, pretty location. "There are seventy-five acres of land, also all kinds of crops, improved land, apples, plums and currants.
