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duties should be placed on the free list, and material reduction should be made in tariff upon the necessities of life, especially upon articles competing with such American manufactures as are sold abroad more cheaply than at home; and gradual reductions should be made in such other schedules as may be necessary to restore the tariff to a revenue basis.

#### On Print Paper.

"Existing duties have given to the manufacturers of paper shelter behind which they have organized combinations to raise the price of pulp paper, thus imposing a tax upon the spread of knowledge. We demand an immediate repeal of the tariff on pulp, print paper, lumber, timber and logs, and that these articles be placed upon the free list.

#### The Courts.

"The courts of justice are the bulwark of our liberties, and we yield to none in our purpose to maintain their dignity. Our party has given to the bench a long line of distinguished judges, who have added to the respect and confidence in which this department must be jealously maintained. We resent the attempt of the Republican party to raise false issues respecting the judiciary. It is an unjust reflection upon the great body of our citizens to assume that they lack respect of the courts.

"It is the function of the courts to interpret the laws which the people create, and if the laws appear to work social and political injustice, it is our duty to change them. The only basis upon which the integrity of the courts can stand is that of unswerving justice and protection of life, personal liberty and property. If judicial processes may be abused, we should guard them against abuse.

#### The Injunction Question.

"Experience has proven the necessity of modification of the present law relating to injunctions, and we reiterate the pledge of our national platforms of 1896 and 1904 in favor of the measure which passed the United States senate in 1906, but which the Republican congress has ever since refused to enact, relating to contempt in the federal courts and providing for trial by jury in cases of indirect contempt.

#### Labor Disputes.

"Questions of judicial practice National Demo RBelHicrzoAYeH have arisen and especially in connection with industrial disputes. We deem that parties to all judicial proceedings should be treated with rigid impartiality, and that injunctions should not be issued in any cases in which injunctions would not issue if no industrial dispute were involved.

"The expanding organization of industry makes it essential that there should be no abridgement of the rights of wage earners, and producers, to organize for the protection of wages and improvement of conditions to the end that such labor organizations and their members should not be regarded as 'illegal combinations in restraint of trade.

#### Eight Hour Day.

"We favor the eight hour day on all government work. We pledge the Democratic party to the enactment of a law by congress, as far as federal jurisdiction extends, for a general employers' liability act covering injury to body or loss of life of employees.

"We pledge the Democratic party to the enactment of a law creating a department of labor, represented separately in the president's cabinet, which department shall include the subject of mines and mining.

"We assert the right of congress to exercise complete control over interstate commerce and the right of each state to exercise like control over commerce within its borders.

#### Enlarge Commission's Powers.

"We demand such enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission as may be necessary to compel the railroads to perform their duties as common carriers, and pre-

vent discrimination and extortion. "We favor efficient supervision and rate regulation of railroads engaged in interstate commerce and to this end we recommend the valuation of railroads by the interstate commerce commission, such valuation to take into consideration the physical value of the property, the original cost of reproduction and all elements of value that will render the valuation fair and just.

#### Railroad Regulation.

"We favor such regulation as will prohibit railroads from engaging in business which brings them into competition with their shippers, also legislation which will assure such reduction in transportation rates as conditions will permit, care being taken to avoid a reduction that would compel a reduction of wages, prevent adequate service or do injustice in legitimate investment. We heartily

approve laws prohibiting the pass and rebate and favor further legislation necessary, to restraint, to control and prevent such abuses.

#### Regarding Rates.

"We favor such legislation as will increase the power of the interstate commerce commission, giving to it initiative with reference to rates and transportation charges put into effect by railroad companies, and permitting the interstate commerce commission, on its own initiative, to declare the rate illegal and as being more than should be charged for such service. That present law relating thereto is inadequate by reason of the fact that the interstate commerce commission is without power to fix or investigate the rate until complaint has been made to them by the shipper.

"We further declare that all agreements of tariff or other associations of railway agents affecting its interstate rates, service, or classification, shall be unlawful unless filed with and approved by the interstate commission.

#### Inspection of Tariffs.

"We favor the enactment of a law giving to the interstate commerce commission power to inspect railroad tariffs or schedules before they shall take effect and, if found unreasonable, to initiate adjustment thereof.

#### Waterways Improvement.

"Water furnishes the cheapest means of transportation and the national government, having control of the navigable waters, should improve them to their fullest capacity. We

earnestly favor the immediate adoption of a liberal and comprehensive plan for the improvement of every water course in the union, which is justified by the needs of commerce, and to secure that end we favor, when practicable, the connection of the great lakes with the navigable rivers, and with each other, and the rivers, bays and sounds of our coasts with each other by artificial canals, with a view to perfecting a system of inland waterways, to be navigated by vessels of standard draught.

#### For Expert Commission.

"We favor the co-ordination of various services of the government connected with waterways, in one service, for the purpose of aiding in the completion of such a system of inland waterways; and we favor the creation of a fund ample for continuous work, which shall be conducted under the direction of a commission of experts to be authorized by law.

#### Other planks were in brief:

A declaration for home rule in the state and opposition to centralized government and that the federal and state government exercise the rights belonging to each.

Denounces the "needless waste of the people's money" by the Republican congress; demands a stop to the extravagance and insists on strict economy.

Denounces the "arbitrary power of the speaker," and pledges the party to adopt rules to enable the majority of the members of congress to "direct

its deliberations and control legislation."

Denounces the increase of the number of office holders and the consequent waste of public lands.

Insists upon just and lawful protection of our citizens (at home and abroad).

Favors the election of senators by direct vote of the people.

"We condemn, as a violation of the spirit of our institutions, the action of the present chief executive in using the patronage of his high office to secure the nomination of one of his cabinet officers.

Favors income tax.

Regulate telephone and telegraph rates.

A navy sufficient to defend the coasts of this country and protect the American citizens wherever their rights may be in jeopardy.

Oppose the admission of Asiatic immigrants.

"We believe in upbuilding the American merchant marine without new or additional burdens upon the people and without bounties from the treasury."

Favors a speedy completion of the Panama canal.

Favors federal aid to state and local authorities in the construction and maintenance of post roads.

"We favor a general pension policy both as a matter of justice to the surviving veterans and their dependents.

Demand international development and the conservation of our natural

resources.

Demand the publicity of campaign contributions.

Pledge legislation under which the national banks shall be required to establish a guarantee fund for the prompt payment of depositors of any insolvent national bank.

Favor a postal savings bank if the guaranteed bank cannot be secured and that it be constituted so as to keep deposited money in the communities where it is established.

Favor vigorous enforcement of the criminal law against guilty trust magistrates and officials, and demand the enactment of additional legislation as may be necessary to make it impossible for private monopoly to exist in the United States.

"Among additional remedies, we specify three: First, a law preventing the duplication of directors among competing corporations; second, a license system which will, without abridging the right of each state to create corporations, or its right to regulate as it will foreign corporations doing business within its limits, make it necessary for manufacturing or trading corporations engaged in interstate commerce to take out federal licenses before it shall be permitted to control as much as twenty-five percent of the product in which it deals; a license to protect the public from watered stock and to prohibit the control by such corporations of more than fifty per cent of the total amount of any product consumed in the United States; third, a law

compelling such licensed corporations to sell to all purchasers in all parts of the country on the same terms after making due allowance for the cost of transportation."
