### ANY COUNTY

WHERE RIDERS ACTIVE TROOPS WILL BE SENT.

Adjutant General Johnston Keeps Militia on Move—Signs of Another Rising.

Frankfort, Ky., July 10.—Troops will occupy any district in the tobacco region where there is any outbreak of the night rider troubles, and it is practically certain that troops are now on guard in Marshall county, where it is said there have been raids during the last few nights. Adjutant General P. P. Johnston said that he had received no report regarding the outbreak in Marshall county, but he was confident that if the raid was pulled off it was during the temporary absence of the soldiers. The troops are now on the scene, and actively in charge of the situation. Major Bassett, who is in command of the troops in western Kentucky, had a conference with General Johnston regarding the situation in his section of the state, but nothing was given out regarding the result of the conference. The conference was arranged so that General Johnston could learn what is needed in western Kentucky.

**Keep Militia on the Move.**

It has not been the policy of the military authorities to keep troops in any one place, and the soldiers have usually been mounted and on patrol. In this way a large section has been covered with a few men, and the soldiers have been as effective as would three times as many men on foot. General Johnston said that it might be that the soldiers had left the section of Marshall county unguarded temporarily, and in that way the night riders have been enabled to get in their work while the soldiers were elsewhere. It is practically certain that the soldiers are now on duty again in Marshall county, and every effort will be made to prevent a repetition of the events of the last few nights.

**Night Riders at Work.**

Reports which have been received by the adjutant general indicated several days ago that the night riders in western Kentucky are making determined efforts to perfect their organization and strengthen their lines, but there was nothing to indicate that they intended committing any unlawful acts. The men who have been behind the tobacco organization are trying to tighten the lines of that society and to this end they have been active recently, but they have shown no disposition to go on raids, so far as the adjutant general has learned, until he heard through the newspapers of the trouble in Marshall county. General Johnston believes that he will be able to handle the situation and that the troubles are almost at an end.
