## DROUGHT LOWERS CORN CONDITION

### Deterioration of Three Points is Due to August Weather.

### Government's Monthly Report Shows Decline for Breadstuffs and Oats.

### BIG LOSS FOR SPRING WHEAT

Drought in important sections of the belt combined with other unfavorable conditions to cause a deterioration of 3.1 points in the condition of the corn crop last month. The national department of agriculture yesterday at noon issued its September crop statement, basing its deductions on reports received from its thousands of correspondents up to the first of the month. The average condition of the crop was given as 79.4, compared to 82.5 on Aug. 1, 89.2 on Sept. 1, 1907, and 90.2 on Sept. 1, 1906. On the popular basis of computation the figures indicate a total yield of about 2,698,000,000 bushels, compared to 2,702,000,000 bushels indicated by the August statement, and approximately 2,592,300,000 bushels harvested last fall.

### Wheat, Oats and Barley Decline.

The report also noted losses in the condition of spring wheat, oats, and barley. It gave the average condition of wheat as 77.6, compared to 80.7 Aug. 1, 77.1 Sept. 1, 1907, and 83.4 Sept. 1, 1906. A crop of about 241,000,000 bushels of the spring variety is indicated, using the popular basis, making the spring yield 667,000,000 bushels. The output last year was in the neighborhood of 230,000,000 bushels. The condition of the oats crop on the first of the month was 69.7, or 7.1 points under that of Aug. 1, a deterioration much more pronounced than grain traders had expected. The condition Sept. 1, 1907, was 64.5. A total crop of 793,000,000 bushels is indicated, compared to an indicated yield of 873,000,000 bushels Aug. 1, and a harvest of about 754,500,000 bushels last year.

### Report is Bullishly Construed.

The statement had a stimulating effect in all the principal markets on the board of trade, although the figures on wheat and corn were about what conservative operators had expected. The effect on the corn market was enhanced by many crop complaints from important parts of the belt which recently have been visited by frost, and the lateness of the plant in many sections was basis for belief that if "Jack the Nipper" made an appearance before Sept. 25 much damage would be done.

### Barley Crop Loses Ground.

The condition of barley at harvest was 81.2, compared to 82.1 on Aug. 1, 1908, and 78.5 on Sept. 1, 1907. A crop of 157,000,000 bushels is indicated, compared to a yield of 153,387,000 bushels last year. The rye harvest was figured at 30,921,000 bushels, compared to a yield of 31,566,000 bushels last year, with an average outturn of 15.4 bushels to the acre and quality 92.7. The average condition of buckwheat on Sept. 1 was 87.8, against 77.4 a year ago. The condition of potatoes on the first of the month was 74.7, compared to 82.9 a month ago and 86.2 a year ago. The important potato states showed as follows: Maine, 86; New York, 67; Michigan, 72; Wisconsin, 73.

The average condition of tobacco on Sept. 1 was 84.3, against 85.8 last month and 82.5 last year. Flaxseed showed an average condition of 82.5 on Sept. 1, against 86.1 last month and 85.4 last year. The average condition of apples on the first of the month was 52.3 compared to 52.2 last month and 34.7, a year ago. The preliminary estimate of the hay yield per acre was 1.52 tons, compared to 1.45 tons finally estimated in 1907. A total production of 67,743,000 tons is indicated, compared with the 1907 final estimate of 63,677,000 tons. The average quality was given as 94.5 against last year.

## DEMOCRATS ARE IN PERFECT ACCORD

### Illinois State Convention Passed Off Smoothly.

### Bryan and Stevenson Deliver Key Note Speeches—Mayor Kern Speaks.

### LOCAL OPTION WAS IGNORED

Peoria, Ill., Sept. 10.—The Democratic state convention passed off smoothly without the faintest ripple of a difference on the floor. The dispute over the question as to whether the platform should contain a personal liberty plank was fought out in a secret meeting of the state committee, the Cook county delegates demanding an expression in favor of personal liberty, and the down-state delegates insisting that if anything was said on the subject that it would be in favor of local option. Finally the committee settled on the platform ignoring the personal liberty question entirely and that saved a fight on the convention floor.

The platform, simply affirms the Denver platform, gives praise to Bryan and Kern, and lauds Adlai E. Stevenson, Democratic candidate for governor. The convention ratified the nominations for state officers made at the recent state primary, nominated four university trustees and listened to the oratory of Bryan and Stevenson.

Mayor Fred J. Kern, of Belleville, Ill., temporary chairman, made a brief speech in which he charged that James W. Van Cleave, president of the National Manufacturers' association, the self-crowned king of plutocracy, is raising a campaign fund from the corporations to aid the Republican national ticket and defeat those candidates who stand for the common people.

United States Senator Gore of Oklahoma, was given an ovation when he stepped forward to speak. He praised Lincoln and Grant and declared you Illinois sons of Democracy now have a chance to give another native son of your state to the nation, William J. Bryan.

## ASSESSOR'S NOTICE

### To Property Owners of Realty and Personalty for Assessment for 1909 as of September 15, 1908.

### Per Charter Second Class Cities, Page 82, Section 3179, City of Paducah, Kentucky.

That all persons owning or having in their possession or under their control as agent, guardian, committee, executor, administrator, curator, trustee, receiver, commissioner or otherwise, tangible or intangible personal property on the fifteenth day of September following, are required, on or before the first day of October, to give him a true and complete list of the same, with true cash value thereof, as of the fifteenth day of September, under oath, upon forms to be furnished on application by said assessor at his office, and that all merchants in the city, doing business for themselves or others, shall in like manner, in addition thereto, state the highest amount in value of all goods, wares, merchandise, owned or kept on hand for sale by said merchants during the three months next preceding such fifteenth day of September. The assessor and his deputies shall be authorized to administer oaths and affirmations, and may examine on oath any person touching his personal property, and the value thereof, and may examine merchants on oath as to the statements they are required to make. The assessor shall keep his office open, and be himself or have a deputy in attendance during the hours from eight a. m. to six p. m., or such other additional hours as may by ordinance be fixed, from the fifteenth day of September to and including the first day of October, excepting Sundays and legal holidays. The assessor shall constantly keep on hand, and furnish to persons lawfully requiring the same, all necessary blanks and forms for the lists and statements required by this act. Nothing herein shall, however, prevent the assessor from assessing from the best information he can gather, and where an assessment has been made against a person who has had actual notice to appear and list his property or make statements thereof and fails to do so, the same shall not be decreased, but may be increased by board of equalization. If any person refuse to attend when summoned, or to be sworn to answer, or to answer any question propounded to him by the assessor or his deputy, the assessor or deputy may, in writing, under oath, state the question, the refusal to answer it, and ask the police judge to issue a warrant against such person; and if the question appear to be a proper one, the said judge shall issue a warrant, and the said person shall, on conviction of having refused to answer the question, it being found by the court to be a proper one, be fined ten dollars; and there compelled by process of contempt to answer the question, and such proper questions as the assessor may propound to him. The assessor shall assess personal property in a separate book, in which he shall separate tangible from intangible property. The word person as used herein shall mean natural and artificial persons, and the duties enjoined on them shall in the case of artificial persons, be performed by the chief officer or agent in the city at the time. Whenever the assessor shall ascertain that there has in any former year or years, been any property omitted that which should have been taxed, he shall assess the same against the person who should have been assessed with it, if living, if not, against his representatives. (See sec. 2984a, which provides for assessment of franchises.)

### All persons owning property of any kind, real or personal, in the City of Paducah, are required to come to the Assessor's office at the City Hall and sign their property lists for assessments, which are now ready for 1909.
