BILL OF MR. BERRY

TO SYSTEMATIZE THE CIRCUIT CLERK'S BUSINESS.

Provides New Basis Entirely For Issuing Processes On Judgments for State.

Hon. Ell Berry, formerly steward at Western Kentucky Asylum for the insane, and now representative in the general assembly, for the city of Owensboro, has introduced a bill in the house which will cause the work of the circuit court clerks throughout the state to be placed on a more systematic basis in the issuing of processes on judgments in favor of the state.

The bill provides for the amendment of section 4245 of the Kentucky statutes. Carroll's compilation and is as follows:

Be it enacted by the general assembly of the commonwealth of Kentucky:

That section 4245 of the Kentucky statutes be amended by striking out of said section the words "at least once in every ten months for five years," and so that said section as amended shall read:

"It shall be the duty of the circuit court clerk of this commonwealth to issue proper process, and place the same in the hands of the sheriff, taking his receipts therefor, within ten days after the adjournment of each term of court, on all judgments in favor of the commonwealth which have not been paid or replevied in the office or remitted or respited by the governor; and shall, within ten days after the maturity of each and every replevied bond on any such judgment, issue executions and place it in the hands of the sheriff as aforesaid; and upon any such execution issued upon any such replevied bond being returned by the sheriff without making the money, he shall reissue executions from time to time as often thereafter as demanded by the commonwealth's or county attorney or sheriff, and place in the hands of the sheriff aforesaid; and upon all such judgments, executions, or capias pro fine, which may be stayed or respited by the governor, the clerk shall issue proper process and place it in the hands of the sheriff as aforesaid within ten days after the expiration of such stay or respite. And it shall also be the duty of the circuit court clerk to make out and forward to the auditor, sometime in the month of June in each year, a full and complete list of all unpaid judgments as aforesaid, showing at what date execution or other process issued, to whom delivered, what return has been made, and the date therefore and upon failure to discharge his duty as required in this section, the clerk's so failed shall be held responsible on his official bond for the amount of the judgment, interest and cost to which such failure is applicable, but nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the governor to remit any judgment unless the same be for a fine imposed as a punishment."

WOOL POOL FORMED

KENTUCKY SHEEP RAISERS NAME BOARD OF CONTROL.

Hemp Growers of Fayette County Also Got Together at Lexington and Sign Agreement.

Lexington, Ky., Feb. 16.—The wool growers of Fayette county organized today a branch of the Kentucky Wool Growers' association, which is now pooling the wool crop of Kentucky along the lines of the plan of the Burley Tobacco society.

A board of control was selected, composed of Representative C. C. Patrick, Albert F. Shuse, J. M. Downing, Rodes Estill, J. Wilson Berry, George D. Karsner and James Beatty. Col. Dick Redd, deputy county assessor, was chosen to submit the pledge to the wool growers of the county for their signature, and he was directed to begin at once a thorough canvass of the county.

The board of control will meet at the court house next Saturday and elect officers for the county branch organized today.

The hemp growers of this county met at the Phoenix hotel this afternoon to complete the plans for a pool which leading growers are promoting and which has already secured a large percentage of the crop that will be grown in the state this year. Former State Senator J. W. Newman, of Woodford county, presided.
