SENSATIONAL COURT HOUSE SCENE AT CLARKSVILLE THIS AFTERNOON—Law Suit Winds Up in a Shooting Scrape That Outdoes Kentucky.

One of the victims was Granly Gilbert, another Young Daniel, and the latter's father. No further particulars were received, but none of the wounded was thought to be fatally hurt.

OPPOSED TO ANNEXATION.

ESTRADA PALAMA AND MAXIMO GOMEZ FAVOR ABSOLUTE INDEPENDENCE FOR CUBA.

New York, July 26.—A letter has been received from Estrada Palama to Horatio Reubens, in which the former denies the utterances in favor of the annexation of Cuba to the United States attributed to him, says a dispatch from Havana to the Tribune. He also denies that Gen. Maximo Gomez made similar declarations on the same occasion and says that he, Palama, and Gomez, both favor absolute independence and oppose annexation. The leaders of all political parties requested the immediate publication of the letter from Senor Palama.

IS THE FIRST

Rev. G. W. Perryman Comes Out in Favor of the Shirt Waist Man.

HE INVITES HIM OUT

Baptist Minister the First to Give Expression in Paducah to Shirt Waist Sentiment.

WILL FORMALLY INVITE TOMORROW

Rev. G. W. Perryman, of the First Baptist church, is the first Paducah minister to come out in favor of the shirt waist as an appropriate garment for church wear. "I cordially invite the men to attend the services at my church in shirt waists if they desire to do so," he said this morning in a conversation with a reporter. "I make this announcement without regard for either approval or condemnation. I want the people in my congregation to be comfortable, and have myself I can truthfully say, often in the past preached in my shirt sleeves."

"Will you wear a shirt waist yourself?" he was asked.

"No, I have a thin coat and thin shirt, and will not wear one myself," he replied "but I am simply saying that I have no objection to those who desire to wear them."

Rev. Perryman came from up in the mountains of Kentucky and is not used to such weather as he has experienced since he came to Paducah. It remains to be seen how many other preachers will give out an expression regarding the shirt waist. Tomorrow in the regular announcements for his Sunday services Rev. Perryman will formally invite the shirt waist men out, and insure them the same hospitable treatment that others receive.

ARM BROKEN.

PAINFUL ACCIDENT TO MR. BOB SUDDETH ON THE J. B. A.

Mr. Bob Suddeth, the well known engineer on the steamer J. B. A., now on the dry docks undergoing repairs, met with a serious accident yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock while at work on the boat. He was down in the hold repairing some machinery when a big box fell down upon him, breaking his left arm very badly. A physician was called and the fracture set and dressed. Today Mr. Suddeth is suffering some little pain, and will not be able to be duty again for some time to come.

MR. CHAS. WEIL

WELL KNOWN YOUNG MAN DIED THIS AFTERNOON.

He Was Overheated a Few Days Ago—No Funeral Arrangements Have Been Made.

Mr. Charles Weil, a well known young man, and son of Mr. Jacob Weil, died this afternoon at twenty minutes to 3 o'clock at the home of his father near Eighth and Jefferson from a complication of diseases, death being hastened by his being overheated a few days ago. Mr. Weil had been in failing health for the past year, and death had been expected for the past two days.

He was 35 years old, unmarried, and leaves besides his parents one brother, Mr. Herman Weil, and three sisters, Mesdames Robert Reeves and Ben Weille, and Miss Ruth Weil. No funeral arrangements have yet been made.

SAWDUST PILE AGAIN.

COURT ECHOES

Will Childers Goes to Jail, and Then to the Lockup.

BALLARD MAN FINED

The Charge of Passing a Confederate Bill Against Will Wright Was Dismissed.

SMALLER OFFENSES PUNISHED BY FINE

Will Childers, colored, evidently likes the penitentiary. Eighteen months ago he was sent over for cutting Bud Dolson, and he came back a few days ago. It appears he began his old tricks, and Dolson became frightened and had him arrested last night on a charge of carrying a pistol, and for flourishing one. He was fined \$25 and given ten days in jail on one charge and fifty dollars and costs for flourishing the weapon, in addition to being placed under a \$200 bond to be of future good behavior. He will be in jail for ten days and then on the chain gang for about three months.

Bob Walters, a young man of Ballard county, should feel fortunate that he got off so easily as he did this morning. He and a companion were driving towards home last evening early and near Twelfth street and the Cairo road, Walters is alleged to have shouted to two small boys, "Get out of the way, you son of a b—." He seemed to be drunk, and one of the boys attempted to crawl through a fence on the side of a hill over which the road passes, and Walters deliberately ran over him knocking him through the fence.

Officer Emil Gourieux was notified by the boy, Reddick Yancey, and procuring a buggy went after the fugitive and drove them this side of Maxon's Mills. Walters succeeded in having the case settled for a \$20 fine.

The case against Minnie Dawson, colored, charged with stealing from Mr. W. H. Riecke's, where she cooked, was continued until tomorrow.

A case against Roger Fury, charged with flourishing a pistol, was continued, and he was released on his own recognizance to appear for trial. It seems the offense was the result of a family difficulty in which he is alleged to have threatened his mother-in-law.

Burt Pittrell and Dora Moore were charged with a breach of the peace and the latter was fined \$10 and costs and the case against the other dismissed.

The case against Wm. Wright, driver of a wagon for Jack Hart, charged with obtaining money by false pretenses by passing a \$20 Confederate bill on a man at the St. John's bar-becue last Saturday, was dismissed on motion of the prosecuting attorney, there being nothing in the case, except that the bill was passed through mistake.

GLENN EVIDENCE ALL IN.

DEFENDANT AS MUCH OF A MYSTERY AS EVER—ARGUMENTS BEGIN TODAY.

Parkersburg, W. Va., July 26.—All the evidence in the Ellis Glenn case was concluded this afternoon and the arguments will begin tomorrow morning. The case will probably be given to the jury by Saturday. The trial has been in progress since July 8 and has been one of the most interesting on record.

Judge Stapleton made two important rulings this morning on motions that had previously been made by the attorneys on both sides. He decided that the defendant would not be compelled to submit to an examination of her head in court to determine whether or not the scar testified to by a number of witnesses for the prosecution existed. This may be considered a victory for either side of the case, as the jury may decide that the refusal to submit to the examination is an admission that the scar really exists. Conviction depends much upon the existence of this scar, and this point has been contested stronger than any other during the trial.

Judge Stapleton also ruled that the misspelling of the name Glenn in the deed of trust had little to do with the case, even if it did not correspond with the name in the indictment.

As the matter now stands, if the defendant should be proven to the satisfaction of the jury to be the same person who was arrested in Illinois it has not been clearly proven that she is the same person who uttered the forged deed. Therefore Ellis Glenn is as much a mystery now as she was when the trial began.

The Paducah boys are reported getting along nicely. George Dennis and Prendo Merritt are getting fat and growing rapidly, and Merritt is a waiter in the dining room. The officers were well treated and are well pleased with their trip.

NO MAYOR TODAY.

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN MANY MONTHS PADUCAH IS WITHOUT ONE.

Mayor Lang and Mayor Pro Tem Davis are both out of the city today and for the first time in many months, Paducah has no mayor or acting mayor. Mayor Lang will probably return tonight from Allensville, and Councilman Davis next week from Memphis, where his family is visiting.

SAD ACCIDENT.

A FALL FROM A CHAIR KILLS A CHILD.

A sad accident which resulted in the death of their baby about one year old, occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wolfe, of the Scotts Chapel neighborhood, in Livingston county Wednesday. The child was sitting in a chair playing with some member of the family when it fell to the floor and sustained injuries about the head and neck which caused its death.

CHARGED WITH DESERTION.

CLAUDE BARNHART ARRESTED LAST NIGHT BY OFFICER GRAY.

Claude Barnhart, son of ex-Police man Jeff Barnhart, was arrested by Officer J. R. Gray last evening on a charge of deserting from the U. S. army. He enlisted in Memphis last March, and was a member of the 37th infantry at Fort McPherson, Ga. He deserted on July 14, becoming tired of army life, and returned to the city a short time ago, to which place he was traced. He does not deny having run away.

Officer Gray secured a mittimus and took him to jail, where he will be held until the army officers at Fort McPherson are heard from.

Marshal Cellius this afternoon received a telegram from Fort McPherson to hold Barnhart until some one is sent for him, and he will be held.

FIRST CASE.

TEN BROECK TIED UP THIS MORNING BY A MAGISTRATE.

Deputy U. S. Marshal La Rue this morning served preliminary papers on the steamer Ten Broeck on a claim for \$12.83 taken out before Justice R. J. Barber by Newton Robinson. The case is set for trial this afternoon at 1 o'clock before U. S. Clerk Puryear.

This is the first case on record here where a boat was summoned on papers taken out before a magistrate, it having always been done heretofore by papers issued by the U. S. commissioner. It is done under the law mentioned yesterday, which authorizes magistrates to do it.

BREAKING THE DEADLOCK.

LONDON, July 26.—The deadlock of the ministers of the powers has ended," says the Pekin correspondent of the Daily Mail. "Russia has withdrawn her proposal to increase the duties to ten per cent and has accepted with some important reservations, Great Britain's counter proposal that the present sources of revenue shall be considered adequate, the powers providing for a shortage if it rises."
