LIBRARY PLANS.

Preliminary Work Returned From Pittsburg This Morning.

Architect Lassiter Will Hold a Meeting of the Library Committee Tonight.

Architect A. L. Lassiter last night received the plans for the public library building from Mr. Edwin H. Anderson, Mr. Carnegie's librarian at Pittsburg, after the plans had been examined and criticised Mr. Anderson has made several criticisms on the work and tonight the library committee will meet to look over the alterations and pass on the criticism of Mr. Anderson. This morning Mr. Lassiter notified the committee that he had received the plans and the meeting will be held in his office as an adjourned meeting. The committee will pass on the work and make the necessary alterations suggested by Mr. Anderson and then the plans proper will be drawn. Those sent to Pittsburg are only preliminary drawings and the plans proper have yet to be prepared. Mr. Lassiter will require from 40 to 50 days to complete the drawings after the work of the committee tonight and the building proper will not begin for several weeks.

The wreck near Mounds, Ill., on the Illinois Central September 12, 1900, in which Duncan Clark's Female minstrels were almost put out of the business, has been investigated in the courts, and a verdict rendered in favor of Clark at Chicago against the railroad for \$9,500. Clark's name is Robert Clark Duncan, and he lives in Cairo. He was almost killed in the wreck, and his special car was demolished. Ten members of the troupe were killed.

The Black Flag was presented at The Kentucky last night by the Ferris Comedians to a good crowd, and the performance was excellent. The specialties were new and greatly enjoyed. WILL BE RELEASED.

METROPOLIS IS TO HAVE HER FERRY BACK.

The little Metropolis ferry boat Kenosis will this afternoon be released and taken back to Metropolis, all claims except the damage suit having been settled.

Willis, one of the biggest stockholders, and several associates arrived in the city this morning from Metropolis with the cash money, and paid claims amounting to \$1,500, all against the boat, with the exception of the \$500 damages asked in a suit against the steamer. GOT FOURTEEN YEARS.

John Hunt a Bartender Convicted of Man Slaughter.

He Killed Ike Daniels Several Months Ago at Metropolis.

John Hunt, the young bartender of Metropolis, Ill., who killed Ike Daniels, a saloonkeeper of Metropolis several months ago, was this morning sentenced to 14 years in the penitentiary for the deed.

Daniels had paid a fine for Hunt for a breach of the peace case in Cairo and Hunt had gone to work for Daniels in Metropolis. The proprietor of the saloon one night held out \$2, the balance on the fine he had paid for Hunt, and Hunt then cut Daniels in the back of the neck with a knife, the wound subsequently causing death. The verdict of the jury was a surprise as the general opinion was that Hunt would get a life sentence if not death.

TOBACCO SALES.

THE OFFERINGS AND SALES YESTERDAY WERE QUITE GOOD.

Yesterday the tobacco dealers had a good day, and the market is reported slightly stronger than of last week. The following is the result of the sales at the local warehouses:

Gilbert and Co.—Offered 24 with 6 rejections. Lugs sold from \$4 to \$5. Common to medium leaf sold from \$5.50 to \$6, while medium to good leaf sold from \$6 to \$7.50. There was no fine leaf offered.

Farmer and Co.—Offered 47, with 2 rejections. Lugs brought from \$4.50 to \$5.50. Common to medium leaf sold from \$5.75 to 7 cents. No medium of good leaf was offered.

The Westerns District Warehouse Co. offered 155 hogsheads yesterday and the sales showed 114.

Lugs brought from \$4.50 to \$5. Common to medium leaf sold from \$5.50 to \$6.50 while medium to good brought from \$6.50 to \$8.25.

The market is reported by the firm as being fully up to that of last week. The prices are about the same but the buyers are using a little more discrimination in regard to the grades and the sales are therefore slowly reached.
