#### WANTS TO GET BAIL.

RELATIVES OF GEORGE TAYLOR  
HERE TO HELP HIM.

An attempt is being made today to secure bail for George Taylor, who is now in jail charged with forgery, in order that he be placed in some hospital or sanitarium for treatment for consumption.

Taylor has had several bad hemorrhages in the past two days, having had one last night and the physicians say if he is not moved soon that he will succumb within a few weeks. Taylor's uncle, Mr. Abe Bruner, of Metropolis, came up this morning to secure bail and is trying to make the necessary \$500 bond to release Taylor.

Taylor claims that a man named Rayborn, of Murray, gave the check to him and stated that Moritz Friedman, of the Paducah Distilleries Co., had turned the check down when presented by Rayborn. Mr. Friedman stated this morning that Rayborn did not present a check but an order, in payment for a bill he owed, and that the order was good and the money paid. Taylor invited the Minneapolis authorities, who think he is the same man who passed checks there to come down and be satisfied that he is the wrong party. The prisoner is also suffering from a fever today and is in a pitiable condition.

#### IS NOT CRAZY.

IS WHAT ROBERT LEE WAS AD-  
JUDGED BY JURY.

Robert Lee, who was arrested two days ago for insanity, was this morning tried in Judge R. T. Lightfoot's court and acquitted.

#### LOSE GOOD CITIZEN

Paducah Tomorrow

Has Accepted a Position with the Win-  
chester Arms Company.

The many friends and acquaintances of Mr. Hart C. Bronough, who for the past several years has made his home in Paducah, will regret to learn that he is to leave Paducah tomorrow to reside permanently in Chicago. Mr. Bronough has accepted a position with the Winchester Arms company, and today received a telegram from Mr. Irby Bennett, Saratoga, N.
