NOTHING TO IT

Assignee Caldwell Will Have a Good Case.

Asked for a Settlement Two Years Ago
—Has All the Records in the Case.

Colonel R. G. Caldwell, assignee of the Paducah Building and Trust company, who was yesterday sued in circuit court by Master Commissioner and Receiver Geo. Husbands for a total of \$89,000, will in a few days file his answer. Colonel Caldwell does not care to talk for publication, but it is learned from a reliable source that he is not at all annoyed by the suit just filed against him, except that the notoriety is somewhat unpleasant.

A friend of Colonel Caldwell said today that Colonel Caldwell's books were recently, when the bond companies went on his bond the last time, examined by an expert and found in good shape, and if they had not been, the company would not have become his surety again.

Two years ago Colonel Caldwell filed suit in circuit court for a settlement of the affairs of the trust company, but it has never been settled. The suit has been continued from time to time and is still pending. Colonel Caldwell paid two dividends, and has receipts, checks, etc., to show for it. When these were demanded by the receiver, he declined to turn them over, it is claimed, preferring to keep them for his own protection. It is alleged that the order removing him as assignee of the company was illegal, as this can be done only by a two-thirds vote of the old stockholders of such companies.

Colonel Caldwell's friends claim that he will show to the satisfaction of all at the proper time by his receipts, checks, etc., where the funds claimed went. The suit filed yesterday is practically a request for a settlement of the affairs of the Paducah Building and Trust company, something Colonel Caldwell himself asked for two years ago, and something he wants as much as anyone. It is said that the reason he did not obey the recent order of court to turn over \$914 for distribution was to force a settlement.

FAILED TO INDICT

Grand Jury Discharged Mr. G. M. Jackson this Morning.

Was Charged in Two Cases With Swearing Falsely in Federal Court.

Mr. George M. Jackson, who for thirteen years has been engaged in a law suit with the Dupoysters, of Ballard county, today received a Christmas present from the grand jury in the form of a complete exoneration on a charge of false swearing, which accusation was made against him recently in a warrant sworn out before Judge Sanders, of the police court, by Mr. Dupoyster.

The Jackson-Dupoyster suit was last tried in the federal court here in November, and Mr. Jackson lost. The following day Dupoyster swore out a warrant against him before Judge Sanders for false swearing in two cases, and the defendant waived examination, and was held.

He executed bond and today the grand jury returned the warrants and announced to the court that the charges had been dismissed and Mr. Jackson fully exonerated, which his many friends will be glad to learn.

Mr. Jackson is undaunted by his thirteen or fourteen years of litigation, and says he will yet win his suit against the Dupoysters.
