IN THE COURTS

Circuit Court.

This morning just before noon the jury brought in a verdict for the defendant in the case of J. N. Cathey for his son, Noah Cathey, against E. Rehkopf.

The boy got hurt at the Rehkopf collar factory in machinery and his father brought suit for \$10,000 damages against the firm of E. Rehkopf & Co., but the petition was thrown out on demurrer. The suit was re-brought against E. Rehkopf himself, and was lost this morning.

This afternoon the case of Witt Duncan against the Western Union Telegraph Co., is on trial. Duncan claims that the company failed to deliver a message sent him about the death of his child from Brookport to Graves Point, Mo., and sues for \$2,000 damages. Attorney D. G. Park is acting special judge, Circuit Judge Wm. M. Reed being ill.

In the case of W. C. Corley against the Paducah Cooperage Co., a mandate from the court of appeals affirming the judgment of the lower court, which was for the defense, was filed.

In the case of C. Boswell and others against the Citizens' Savings bank, additional reasons for a new trial were filed.

The young woman had an arm broken and claimed Dr. Dorris set it wrong and caused her permanent injury. The defense has moved for a new trial and the motion comes up for hearing today.

Judge Reed granted a temporary injunction in the case and the motion to make it permanent is being made today.

The hearing of the petition for a re-sale of the Hessig distillery property has been fixed for the 25th of the month. The petition will be tried by Referee Bagby.

The show-cases in the Taylor Fisher bankrupt case have been ordered sold at public auction. The trustee attempted to get 75 per cent of the value at private sale but could not.

LEVAN RELEASED.

Engineer Claimed \$18 Wages—The Clifton Case to Be Compromised.

Commissioner W. A. Gardner this morning tried the case of Edward Lawyer against the gasoline boat Levan and dismissed the petition.

Lawyer brought a petition in the admiralty court against the boat for \$18 alleged to be due for wages as engineer. The proof was not sufficient.

Deputy U. S. Marshal George Saunders released the boat this morning.

Boat Will Be Released.

This afternoon attorneys for the Clifton and the St. Bernard Coal Co. are conferring with a view of effecting some agreement relative to the claim. The boat attorneys want to release the boat from the attachment. It is thought some kind of a compromise will be effected this afternoon by which the boat may be released.

Damage Suit Revised.

The appellate court at Frankfort yesterday reversed the circuit court here in the case of Frank Slaughter vs. the N., C. & St. L. R. Co.

Slaughter was employed by the railroad as a brakeman and while engaged in his occupation in trying to catch the caboose of his train last summer was thrown under the wheels of the train and his leg so injured that amputation was necessary. He brought suit to recover damages and the railroad company moved that the case should be tried in the federal circuit court on the grounds that the railroad company was a citizen of another state. The lower court decided in the railroad's favor and the appellate court reversed this decision and then ordered that the local circuit court try the case.

Suspect Was Photographed.

A photograph of Bud Ballanger, colored, who is supposed to be wanted in Tunica county, Miss., for murder, was taken yesterday and sent to Tunica county for identification. Officer Emil Gouirieux arrested the negro for petty larceny and noticed his description tallied with that of a murderer who is wanted in Mississippi. If the negro proves to be the right one Officer Gouirieux will receive a reward of \$1300 for arresting him.

Germans May Be Drafted to Army. Copenhagen, Jan. 11—All German citizens living in Denmark liable to military service in the fatherland are warned to hold themselves in readiness to return to Germany upon three days' notice.
