### THE COUNCIL.

Regular Meeting This Evening at the City Hall.

There is Little Business to Be Transacted—Committee Appointments.

The city council meets tonight in regular session, and there is very little business to transact.

A report on the financial condition of the city, and the estimated cost of running the city under the second class charter has not been prepared, and will consequently not be ready. It is a big job, and will require considerable time. The clerk is now preparing the report asked by Councilman Reed.

Mayor Yeiser stated this morning that he did not think he would make the police appointments tonight, but intimated that he might possibly change his mind. He will no doubt make his committee assignments, which is a very important matter, and often means much to the city.

Tax Collector Kraus will report the collection of \$649,411.

The range of Mrs. Woolfolk's, on Broadway, was damaged, and also that of Mr. James Houser, on Tennessee street.

There is another candidate for election of Oak Grove. Mr. Wm. Parsons and Mrs. Graham were the only applicants but Mr. Churchill, of the South Side, has entered the race. The appointment is made by the cemetery commission of the council.

### THREE RUNS.

One Shanty on West Broadway Burned Yesterday Afternoon.

Two Other Runs Yesterday By the Fire Department—Little Damage.

A small three room shanty, occupied by colored people, in the rear of the old Rhea Boyd home on West Broadway, just beyond Fountain Avenue, was completely destroyed by fire last night about 8 o'clock.

The house was occupied by a servant in the family, and all the household goods and \$50 in money were destroyed. The origin of the conflagration is not known. The owners of the household effects saved nothing, and the house and furniture are a complete loss, with no insurance.

The departments made another run yesterday morning about 8 o'clock to West Broadway to a small frame dwelling near the High School building. A small blaze had sprung from a defective terra cotta fire, but was extinguished before the firemen arrived. There was little damage done the building other than the loss of a few shingles.

A blaze was discovered in Scott's barber shop, on Broadway near Third, Saturday night at 1:30 o'clock. A cover fire fell across some kindling and ignited it. The fire was extinguished by the fire department with Babcocks.

This morning a pile of solum caught fire from a match or a cigarette in F. Schiffman's plumbing shop under the Palmer, and for a short time there was danger of a serious conflagration. The blaze was soon extinguished, however, without serious damage.

### GREAT DAMAGE.

Deaths Reported From Various Places Today.

Flood and Cold Wave Cause Great Suffering in Pennsylvania.

Louisville, Dec. 16.—Six or seven people froze to death in different parts of the state last night. The weather is moderating slightly in most places, with indications of snow.

Pittsburg, Dec. 16.—Flood and cold wave together have caused great damage and widespread suffering here. Hundreds of big plants are inundated and closed on account of the temperature. The waters are receding.

Ithaca, N. Y., Dec. 16.—This part of the state is flooded. No trains are running, and immense damage is done in many towns.

St. Louis, Dec. 16.—Joseph Novak, editor of the Bohemian Voice, was frozen to death while coming in from the country.

New Orleans, Dec. 16.—It is believed that the cold wave is broken in the South. It is thirty above here, ten above at Atlanta, has moderating.
